AMENDATORY 59 O.S. 2011, Section 1423, as renumbered by Section 5, Chapter 18, O.S.L. 2014, and as last 17 amended by Section 1, Chapter 101, O.S.L. 2016 (2 O.S. Supp. 2016, 18 19 Section 11-92), is amended to read as follows: 20 Section 11-92. A. Every scrap metal dealer shall keep a separate book, record or other electronic system as authorized by 21 the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act, to record and maintain the 22 23 following data from any seller of any amount of scrap metal as 24 defined by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act:

A legible photocopy of the seller's driver license or other
 form of government issued photo identification that contains his or
 her name, address, date of birth, weight and height;

4 2. Vehicle description and license tag number of the seller if5 the vehicle was used to transport the material being sold;

3. Date and place of the transaction and the transaction number
7 as provided by the scrap metal dealer;

8 4. Description of the items sold and weight of the items as
9 required by the provisions of the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act;
10 5. Whether the scrap metal is in wire, cable, bar, rod, sheet
11 or tube form;

12 6. If any insulation is on the scrap metal, the names and
13 addresses of the persons, groups or corporations from whom seller
14 purchased or obtained the materials; and

15 7. If apparent on the scrap metal, the name of the manufacturer16 and serial number of each item of scrap metal.

B. Municipalities or other political subdivisions may prescribe
the reporting methods and the format of the information required by
subsection A of this section, either written, electronic or
internet-based.

C. Records required by this section shall be made available at any time to any person authorized by law for such inspection.

D. Purchases of thirty-five (35) pounds or more of scrap metalcontaining a manufacturer's serial number or other unique label or

mark shall be held separate and apart so that the purchased scrap metal may be readily identifiable from all other purchases for a period of not less than ten (10) days from the date of purchase. During the holding period the scrap metal dealer may not change the form of the purchased scrap metal and shall permit any person authorized by law to make inspection of such materials.

7 Ε. Purchases of thirty-five (35) pounds or more of scrap metal which does not contain a manufacturer's serial number or other 8 9 unique label or mark shall either be held for the same time and in 10 the same manner as required by subsection D of this section; or in the alternative, the scrap metal dealer shall be required to obtain 11 12 a digital image of the items purchased, the seller of the items, a copy of the bill of sale and a copy of the seller's photo 13 identification. The digital image shall contain a depiction that 14 can reasonably be utilized for identification of the seller and the 15 items sold and captured in the common JPEG format with a minimum 16 resolution of 640 pixels by 480 pixels. The digital image shall be 17 retained by the purchaser for a minimum of ninety (90) days from the 18 date of purchase. For the purpose of this section a "digital image" 19 means a raster-based two-dimensional, rectangular array of static 20 data elements called pixels, intended for display on a computer 21 monitor or for transformation into another format, such as a printed 22 23 page.

F. No purchase of any amount of scrap metal from an exempted
 seller, as defined by Section 11-91 of this title, shall be subject
 to any holding period or digital imaging identification required by
 subsection D or E of this section.

5 G. It shall be unlawful for any person to sell or purchase 6 copper material or copper wire from which the actual or apparent 7 insulation or other coating has been burned, melted or exposed to 8 heat or fire resulting in melting some or all of the insulation or 9 coating. This provision shall not apply to sales by or purchases 10 from an exempted seller.

11 Η. It shall be unlawful for any scrap metal dealer to purchase 12 any item from a minor without having first obtained the consent, in writing, of a parent or guardian of such minor. Such written 13 consent shall be kept with the book, record or other electronic 14 15 recording system required by subsection A of this section and, if requested by a law enforcement agency where the purchase was made, 16 shall be transmitted to the law enforcement agency and may be kept 17 as a permanent record and made available for public inspection. 18

I. A scrap metal dealer shall obtain from each seller of a scrap metal item regulated by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act, or a parent or guardian on behalf of a minor, a written declaration of ownership containing a legible signature of the seller. The declaration of ownership shall be in the following form and shall appear on the bill of sale or transaction ticket to be completed by

1 the seller in the presence of the purchaser at the time of the 2 transaction:

"I hereby affirm under penalty of prosecution that I am the rightful owner of the hereon described merchandise; or I am an authorized representative of the rightful owner and affirm that I have been given authority by the rightful owner to sell the hereon described merchandise.

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Signature"

J. If requested by a law enforcement agency, a scrap metal dealer shall report in writing all purchases of scrap metal as defined by the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act within forty-eight (48) hours following such purchase. The report shall contain all the information required by this section.

15 K. A scrap metal dealer purchasing a vehicle from any person shall be required to record the information required in subsection A 16 of this section and the make, model, license tag number and vehicle 17 identification number of the purchased vehicle. A person selling a 18 vehicle to a scrap metal dealer shall be required to present to the 19 dealer the title of the vehicle or a verified bill of sale from the 20 owner of the vehicle or other proof of ownership certificate of 21 ownership form, as approved by the Oklahoma Tax Commission and 22

23 <u>available at the Oklahoma Tax Commission or through a motor license</u> 24 agent, in addition to signing a declaration of ownership as required by subsection I of this section. The provisions of this subsection
 shall not apply to sales, purchases or other transfer of vehicles
 between scrap metal dealers and licensed automotive dismantlers and
 parts recyclers.

L. The provisions of the Oklahoma Scrap Metal Dealers Act shall
not apply to the sale or purchase of aluminum beverage cans for
recycling purposes.

M. A scrap metal dealer shall not enter into any cash 8 9 transactions in excess of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) in 10 payment for the purchase of scrap metal that is listed in subsection 11 B of Section 11-93 of this title unless the transaction is made with 12 an exempted seller. Payment by check shall be issued and made payable only to the seller of the scrap metal whose identification 13 information has been obtained pursuant to the provisions of this 14 15 section.

A district attorney, United States Attorney, or Attorney
 General of this or another state and the employees of such offices
 in the course of their official duties pursuant to this title or the
 prosecution of crimes against children, or upon their request in
 their official capacity as advisor in a grand jury proceeding;

The attorney representing a child who is the subject of a
 proceeding pursuant to the provisions of this title or other
 proceeding where child custody or visitation is at issue;

Employees of juvenile bureaus in the course of their
 official duties pursuant to this title, and employees of the
 Department of Human Services in the course of their official duties;

5. Employees of a law enforcement agency of this or another
state or military enclave and employees of a child protective
service of another state or military enclave in the course of their
official duties pertaining to investigations of a report of known or

B. In addition to the persons listed in subsection A of this section, juvenile court records may be inspected, and their contents shall be disclosed, without a court order to the following persons upon showing of proper credentials and pursuant to their lawful duties:

Employees of court-appointed special advocate programs, as
 defined in Section 1-1-105 of this title, in the course of their
 official duties pertaining to recruiting, screening, training,

1 assigning cases, supervising, and supporting volunteers in their 2 roles as guardian ad litem pursuant to Section 1-4-306 of this 3 title;

Members of postadjudication review boards established
 pursuant to the provisions of Section 1116.2 of Title 10 of the
 Oklahoma Statutes, the Child Death Review Board, and
 multidisciplinary personnel. In addition to juvenile court records,
 members of such postadjudication review boards may inspect, without
 a court order, information that includes, but is not limited to:

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- psychological and medical records,
- b. placement history and information, including the names
 and addresses of foster parents,
- 13 c. family assessments,

14 d. treatment or service plans, and

15 e. school records;

The Department of Human Services or other public or private 16 3. agency or individual having court-ordered custody or physical 17 custody pursuant to Department placement of the child, or conducting 18 a child abuse or neglect investigation of the child who is the 19 subject of the record. In addition to juvenile court records, 20 employees of the Department may inspect, without a court order and 21 upon a showing of proper credentials and pursuant to their lawful 22 duties, information that includes, but is not limited to: 23

24 a. psychological and medical records, and

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b. nondirectory education records;

The child who is the subject of the record and the parents,
 legal guardian, custodian, or foster parent of such child; and

4 5. A person authorized by the court to conduct bona fide
5 research, provided such research may not publish the names or
6 identities of parents, children, or other persons contained in the
7 records.

8 C. In addition to the persons and entities named in subsection 9 A of this section, Department of Human Services agency records may 10 be inspected, and their contents shall be disclosed, without a court 11 order to the following persons upon showing of proper credentials 12 and pursuant to their lawful duties:

Postadjudicatory review boards, court-appointed special
 advocates, and members of the Child Death Review Board;

15 2. Any district court which has ordered a home study by the 16 Department in an action for divorce, annulment, custody of a child, 17 or appointment of a legal guardian of a child, or any subsequent 18 proceeding in such actions; provided, however, the Department may 19 limit disclosure in the home study to summaries or to information 20 directly related to the purpose of the disclosure;

3. Members of multidisciplinary teams or multidisciplinary
 personnel designated by the Department, investigating a report of
 known or suspected child abuse or neglect or providing services to a
 child or family which is the subject of the report;

4. A physician who has before him or her a child whom the
 physician reasonably suspects may be abused or neglected or any
 health care or mental health professionals involved in the
 evaluation or treatment of the child or the parents, legal guardian,
 foster parent, custodian, or other family members of the child;

5. Any public or private agency or person authorized by the
Department to diagnose, or provide care, treatment, supervision, or
other services to a child who is the subject of a report or record
of child abuse or neglect; provided, the Department may limit such
disclosure to summaries or to information directly necessary for the
purpose of such disclosure;

12 6. Any person or agency for research purposes, if all of the13 following conditions are met:

a. the person or agency conducting the research is
employed by the State of Oklahoma or is under contract
with this state and is authorized by the Department to
conduct the research, and

b. the person or agency conducting the research ensures
that all documents containing identifying information
are maintained in secure locations and access to the
documents by unauthorized persons is prohibited; that
no identifying information is included in documents
generated from the research conducted; and that all

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4 8. A medical examiner when such person is determining the cause5 of death of a child.

D. In accordance with the rules promulgated for such purpose
pursuant to Section 620.6 of Title 10 of the Oklahoma Statutes,
records listed in subsection A of Section 1-6-102 of this title may
be inspected and their contents disclosed without a court order to
participating agencies.

E. The court may disclose to an employee of an out-of-state entity, licensed to perform adoption home studies in that state, whether the prospective adoptive parent has had parental rights to a child terminated in Oklahoma or whether the prospective adoptive parent has relinquished parental rights to a child in Oklahoma.

16 F. Nothing in this section shall be construed as prohibiting 17 the Department from disclosing such confidential information as may 18 be necessary to secure appropriate care, treatment, protection or 19 supervision of a child alleged to be abused or neglected.

10 6. Any other place specifically prohibited by law.

B. For purposes of paragraphs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 of subsection A of this section, the prohibited place does not include and specifically excludes the following property:

Any property set aside for the use or parking of any
 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, by a city, town, county,
 state or federal governmental authority;

Any property set aside for the use or parking of any
 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, by any entity offering any
 professional sporting event which is open to the public for
 admission, or by any entity engaged in pari-mutuel wagering gambling
 authorized by law;

3. Any property adjacent to a structure, building or office
space in which concealed or unconcealed weapons are prohibited by
the provisions of this section;

Any property designated by a city, town, county or state
 governmental authority as a park, recreational area, or fairgrounds;
 provided, nothing in this paragraph shall be construed to authorize
 any entry by a person in possession of a concealed or unconcealed
 handgun into any structure, building or office space which is
 specifically prohibited by the provisions of subsection A of this
 section; and

5. Any property set aside by a public or private elementary or secondary school for the use or parking of any vehicle, whether attended or unattended; provided, however, said handgun shall be stored and hidden from view in a locked motor vehicle when the motor vehicle is left unattended on school property.

13 Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection or subsection C of this section shall be construed to authorize or 14 15 allow any person in control of any place described in paragraph 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5 of subsection A of this section to establish any policy 16 or rule that has the effect of prohibiting any person in lawful 17 possession of a handgun license from possession of a handgun 18 allowable under such license in places described in paragraph 19 3, 4 or 5 of this subsection. 20

C. A concealed or unconcealed weapon may be carried onto private school property or in any school bus or vehicle used by any private school for transportation of students or teachers by a person who is licensed pursuant to the Oklahoma Self-Defense Act,

1 provided a policy has been adopted by the governing entity of the 2 private school that authorizes the carrying and possession of a 3 weapon on private school property or in any school bus or vehicle used by a private school. Except for acts of gross negligence or 4 5 willful or wanton misconduct, a governing entity of a private school that adopts a policy which authorizes the possession of a weapon on 6 7 private school property, a school bus or vehicle used by the private school shall be immune from liability for any injuries arising from 8 9 the adoption of the policy. The provisions of this subsection shall 10 not apply to claims pursuant to the Workers' Compensation Code 11 Adminstrative Workers' Compensation Act.

D. Notwithstanding paragraph 3 of subsection A of this section, a board of education of a school district may adopt a policy pursuant to Section 5-149.2 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes to authorize the carrying of a handgun onto school property by school personnel specifically designated by the board of education, provided such personnel either:

Possess a valid armed security guard license as provided for
 in Section 1750.1 et seq. of Title 59 of the Oklahoma Statutes; or

Hold a valid reserve peace officer certification as provided
 for in Section 3311 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes.
 Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to restrict authority
 granted elsewhere in law to carry firearms.

1 Any person violating the provisions of paragraphs 2 or 3 of Ε. 2 subsection A of this section shall, upon conviction, be guilty of a 3 misdemeanor punishable by a fine not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty 4 Dollars (\$250.00). A person violating any other provision of 5 subsection A of this section may be denied entrance onto the 6 property or removed from the property. If the person refuses to 7 leave the property and a peace officer is summoned, the person may be issued a citation for an amount not to exceed Two Hundred Fifty 8 9 Dollars (\$250.00).

F. No person in possession of a valid handgun license issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Self-Defense Act shall be authorized to carry the handgun into or upon any college, university or technology center school property, except as provided in this subsection. For purposes of this subsection, the following property shall not be construed as prohibited for persons having a valid handgun license:

17 1. Any property set aside for the use or parking of any 18 vehicle, whether attended or unattended, provided the handgun is 19 carried or stored as required by law and the handgun is not removed 20 from the vehicle without the prior consent of the college or 21 university president or technology center school administrator while 22 the vehicle is on any college, university or technology center 23 school property;

2. Any property authorized for possession or use of handguns by
 college, university or technology center school policy; and

3 3. Any property authorized by the written consent of the
4 college or university president or technology center school
5 administrator, provided the written consent is carried with the
6 handgun and the valid handgun license while on college, university
7 or technology center school property.

The college, university or technology center school may notify 8 9 the Oklahoma State Bureau of Investigation within ten (10) days of a 10 violation of any provision of this subsection by a licensee. Upon 11 receipt of a written notification of violation, the Bureau shall 12 give a reasonable notice to the licensee and hold a hearing. At the hearing, upon a determination that the licensee has violated any 13 provision of this subsection, the licensee may be subject to an 14 administrative fine of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) and may 15 have the handgun license suspended for three (3) months. 16

Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection shall be 17 construed to authorize or allow any college, university or 18 technology center school to establish any policy or rule that has 19 the effect of prohibiting any person in lawful possession of a 20 handgun license from possession of a handgun allowable under such 21 license in places described in paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this 22 subsection. Nothing contained in any provision of this subsection 23 shall be construed to limit the authority of any college, university 24

1 or technology center school in this state from taking administrative 2 action against any student for any violation of any provision of 3 this subsection.

The provisions of this section shall not apply to any peace 4 G. 5 officer or to any person authorized by law to carry a pistol in the 6 course of employment. District judges, associate district judges 7 and special district judges, who are in possession of a valid handgun license issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma 8 9 Self-Defense Act and whose names appear on a list maintained by the 10 Administrative Director of the Courts, shall be exempt from this 11 section when acting in the course and scope of employment within the 12 courthouses of this state. Private investigators with a firearms authorization shall be exempt from this section when acting in the 13 course and scope of employment. 14

H. For the purposes of this section, "motor vehicle" means anyautomobile, truck, minivan or sports utility vehicle.

Provided, however, that no person who has been convicted of or who has entered a plea other than not guilty to 17 an offense enumerated in paragraph 2 of Section 571 of Title 57 of 18 19 the Oklahoma Statutes, as an exception to the definition of "nonviolent offense" shall be eligible for a community sentence or 20 community punishment unless the district attorney or an assistant 21 district attorney for the district in which the offender's 22 conviction was obtained consents thereto. The district attorney may 23 consent to eligibility for an offender who has a mental illness or a 24

developmental disability or a co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse disorder and who scores in the low range on the LSI or has an assessment authorized by Section 3-704 of Title 43A of the Oklahoma Statutes or another assessment instrument if the offender is not otherwise prohibited by law. An owner other than an owner of an antique or a classic 20 automobile as defined by the Oklahoma Tax Commission who files an 21 affidavit that a vehicle shall not be driven upon the public 22 highways or public streets, pursuant to Section 7-607 of this title, 23 who drives or permits the driving of the vehicle upon the public 24 highways or public streets, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be subject to a fine of not more than Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00), or imprisonment for not more than thirty (30) days, or by both such fine and imprisonment, and in addition thereto, shall be subject to suspension of the driving privilege of the person in accordance with Section 7-605 of this title.

B. A sentence imposed for any violation of the Compulsory
Insurance Law may be suspended or deferred in whole or in part by
the court.

Any person producing proof in court that a current security 11 verification form or equivalent form which has been issued by the 12 Department of Public Safety reflecting liability coverage for the person was in force at the time of the alleged offense shall be 13 entitled to dismissal of the charge. The peace officer 14 authority of employees designated as peace officers shall be limited 15 to: maintaining custody of prisoners; preventing attempted escapes; 16 pursuing, recapturing and incarcerating escapees and parole or 17 probation violators and arresting such escapees, parole or probation 18 violators, serving warrants, and performing any duties specifically 19 required for the job descriptions. Such powers and duties of peace 20 officers may be exercised for the purpose of maintaining custody, 21 security, and control of any prisoner being transported outside this 22 state as authorized by the Uniform Criminal Extradition Act. 23 То become qualified for designation as peace officers, employees shall 24

meet the training and screening requirements conducted by the Department and certified by the Council on Law Enforcement Education and Training within twelve (12) months of employment or, in the case of employees designated as peace officers on or before July 1, 1997, by July 1, 1998, and shall not be subject to Section 3311 of Title 70 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

To regulate the operation of canteens for prisoners; To prescribe rules for the conduct, management, and 8 8. 9 operation of each institution, including rules for the demeanor of 10 prisoners, the punishment of recalcitrant prisoners, the treatment 11 of incorrigible prisoners, and the disposal of property or 12 contraband seized from inmates or offenders under the supervision of 13 the Department;

To transfer prisoners from one institution to another; 14 15 To establish procedures that ensure inmates are educated 10. 16 and provided with the opportunity to execute advance directives for health care in compliance with Section 3101.2 of Title 63 of the 17 Oklahoma Statutes. The procedures shall ensure that any inmate 18 executing an advanced advance directive for health care is competent 19 and executes the directive with informed consent; 20

21 11. To maintain courses of training and instruction for 22 employees at each institution;

23 12. To maintain a program of research and statistics;

13. To provide for the periodic audit, at least once annually,
 of all funds and accounts of each institution and the funds of each
 prisoner;

To provide, subject to rules established by the State Board 4 14. 5 of Corrections, for the utilization of inmate labor for any agency of the state, city, town, or subdivision of this state, upon the 6 7 duly authorized request for such labor by the agency. The inmate labor shall not be used to reduce employees or replace regular 8 9 maintenance or operations of the agency. The inmate labor shall be 10 used solely for public or state purposes. No inmate labor shall be used for private use or purpose. Insofar as it is practicable, all 11 12 inmate labor shall be of such a nature and designed to assist and 13 aid in the rehabilitation of inmates performing the labor;

To provide clerical services for, and keep and preserve the 15. 14 15 files and records of, the Pardon and Parole Board; make 16 investigations and inquiries as to prisoners at the institutions who are to be, or who might be, considered for parole or other clemency; 17 assist prisoners who are to be, or who might be, considered for 18 parole or discharge in obtaining suitable employment in the event of 19 20 parole or discharge; report to the Pardon and Parole Board, for recommendation to the Governor, violations of terms and conditions 21 of paroles; upon request of the Governor, make investigations and 22 inquiries as to persons who are to be, or who might be, considered 23 24 for reprieves or leaves of absence; report to the Pardon and Parole

1 Board, for recommendation to the Governor, whether a parolee is 2 entitled to a pardon, when the terms and conditions of the parole 3 have been completed; make presentence investigations for, and make reports thereof to, trial judges in criminal cases before sentences 4 5 are pronounced; supervise persons undergoing suspended sentences, or 6 who are on probation or parole; and develop and operate, subject to 7 the policies and guidelines of the Board, work-release centers, community treatment facilities or prerelease programs at appropriate 8 9 sites throughout this state;

All reintegration referral services shall be subject to the availability 6 of funds; 7

19. To conduct continual planning and research and periodically 8 9 evaluate the effectiveness of the various correctional programs 10 instituted by the Department; manage the designing, building, and 11 maintaining of all the capital improvements of the Department; 12 establish and maintain current and efficient business, bookkeeping, and accounting practices and procedures for the operations of all 13 institutions and facilities, and for the Department's fiscal 14 affairs; conduct initial orientation and continuing in-service 15 16 training for the Department employees; provide public information services; inspect and examine the condition and management of state 17 penal and correctional institutions; investigate complaints 18 concerning the management of prisons or alleged mistreatment of 19 inmates thereof; and hear and investigate complaints as to 20 misfeasance or nonfeasance of employees of the Department; 21 To authorize any division of the Department to sell 22 20. advertising in any Department-approved publication, media production 23

24 or other informational material produced by the Department;

provided, that such advertising shall be approved by the Director or designee prior to acceptance for publication. The sale of advertising and negotiation of rates for the advertising shall not be subject to The Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act or the Administrative Procedures Act. The Department shall promulgate rules establishing criteria for accepting or using advertisements as authorized in this paragraph;

8 21. To issue subpoenas to assist or further investigations into 9 allegations of crimes committed in public or private prisons within 10 the State of Oklahoma. Subpoenas issued by the Director shall be 11 enforced by the District Court in Oklahoma County, Oklahoma;

12 22. To authorize award of the badge of an employee who dies 13 while employed by the Department to the spouse or next of kin of the 14 deceased employee; and

15 23. To establish, in conjunction with the Information Services 16 Division of the Office of Management and Enterprise Services, an 17 emergency alert notification system for the public, capable of 18 distributing notifications of facility emergencies or prisoner 19 escapes for all facilities and each facility of the Department of 20 Corrections; and

21 <u>24. To declare an emergency when, due to shortage of staff,</u>

3 When an employee of the Department of Corrections has been Β. charged with a violation of the rules of the Department or with a 4 5 felony pursuant to the provisions of a state or federal statute, the 6 Director may, in the Director's discretion, suspend the charged 7 employee, in accordance with the Oklahoma Personnel Act and/or the Merit System of Personnel Administration Rules, pending the hearing 8 9 and final determination of the charges. Notice of suspension shall 10 be given by the Director, in accordance with the provisions of the 11 Oklahoma Personnel Act. If after completion of the investigation of 12 the charges, it is determined that such charges are without merit or are not sustained before the Oklahoma Merit Protection Commission or 13 in a court of law, the employee shall be reinstated and shall be 14 15 entitled to receive all lost pay and benefits.

The express approval of the Legislature and the Governor if

 beneficiary;

16 3. The express approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the membership 17 of the governing body of the beneficiary if a municipality is a 18 beneficiary; or

19 4. The express approval of two-thirds (2/3) of the membership 20 of the governing body of each beneficiary in the event a trust has 21 more than one beneficiary; provided, that no funds of a beneficiary 22 derived from sources other than the trust property, or the operation 23 thereof, shall be charged with or expended for the execution of the 24 trust, except by express action of the legislative authority of the 1 beneficiary prior to the charging or expending of the funds. The 2 officers or any other governmental agencies or authorities having 3 the custody, management, or control of any property, real or personal or mixed, of the beneficiary of the trust, or of a proposed 4 5 trust, which property shall be needful for the execution of the 6 trust purposes, are authorized and empowered to lease the property 7 for those purposes, after the acceptance of the beneficial interest therein by the beneficiary as hereinafter provided. 8

9 B. Any trust created pursuant to the provisions of this 10 section, in whole or in part, may engage in activities outside of 11 the geographic boundaries of its beneficiary, so long as the 12 activity provides a benefit to a large class of the public within 13 the beneficiary's geographic area or lessens the burdens of 14 government of the beneficiary and which does not solely provide a 15 benefit by generating administrative fees.

16 C. A municipality may convey title to real property which is used for an airport to the trustees of an industrial development 17 authority trust whose beneficiary is the municipality. 18 The industrial development authority trust must already have the 19 custody, management, or control of the real property. 20 The conveyance must be approved by a majority of the governing body of 21 the municipality. A conveyance pursuant to this section may be made 22 only for the sole purpose of allowing the authority to sell the 23 24 property for fair market value when the property is to be used for

No trust in which a county or municipality is the beneficiary shall hereafter create an indebtedness or obligation until the indebtedness or obligation has been approved by a twothirds (2/3) vote of the governing body of the beneficiary. In the event a trust has more than one beneficiary, as authorized by this section, the trust shall not incur an indebtedness or obligation until the indebtedness or obligation has been approved by a twothirds (2/3) vote of the governing body of two-thirds (2/3) of the beneficiaries of the trust. <u>Provided, however, a municipality with</u> <u>a governing body consisting of fewer than seven (7) members shall be</u> <u>required to approve the creation of an indebtedness or obligation</u> <u>under this subsection by a three-fifths (3/5) vote of the governing</u> body.

G. All bonds described in subsection F of this section, after 8 9 December 1, 1976, except bonds sold to the federal government or any 10 agency thereof or to any agency of the State of Oklahoma, shall be 11 awarded to the lowest and best bidder based upon open competitive 12 public offering, advertised at least once a week for two (2) 13 successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where the principal office of the trust is located prior to the date 14 15 on which bids are received and opened; provided, competitive bidding may be waived on bond issues with the approval of three-fourths 16 (3/4) of the trustees, and a three-fourths (3/4) vote of the 17 governing body of the beneficiary, unless the beneficiary is a 18 county in which case a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the members of the 19 governing body shall be required, or three-fourths (3/4) vote of the 20 governing bodies of each of the beneficiaries of the trust, unless 21 one of the beneficiaries is a county in which case a two-thirds 22 (2/3) vote of the members of the governing body of such county shall 23 24 be required. No bonds shall be sold for less than par value, except

1 upon approval of three-fourths (3/4) of the trustees, unless the 2 beneficiary is a county in which case a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the 3 members of the governing body shall be required. In no event shall bonds be sold for less than sixty-five percent (65%) of par value; 4 5 provided, however, in no event shall the original purchaser from the issuer of any bonds issued by any public trust for any purpose 6 7 receive directly or indirectly any fees, compensation, or other remuneration in excess of four percent (4%) of the price paid for 8 9 the bonds by the purchaser of the bonds from the original purchaser; 10 and further provided, that the average coupon rate thereon shall in 11 no event exceed fourteen percent (14%) per annum. No public trust 12 shall sell bonds for less than ninety-six percent (96%) of par value until the public trust has received from the underwriter or 13 financial advisor or, in the absence of an underwriter or financial 14 15 advisor, the initial purchaser of the bonds, an estimated 16 alternative financing structure or structures showing the estimated total interest and principal cost of each alternative. At least one 17 alternative financing structure shall include bonds sold to the 18 public at par. Any estimates shall be considered a public record of 19 the public trust. Bonds, notes or other evidences of indebtedness 20 issued by any public trust shall be eligible for purchase by any 21 state banking association or corporation subject to such limitations 22 as to investment quality as may be imposed by regulations, rules or 23 24 rulings of the State Banking Commissioner.

H. Public trusts created pursuant to this section shall file annually, with their respective beneficiaries, copies of financial documents and reports sufficient to demonstrate the fiscal activity of such trust, including, but not limited to, budgets, financial reports, bond indentures, and audits. Amendments to the adopted budget shall be approved by the trustees of the public trust and recorded as such in the official minutes of such trust.

I. Contracts for construction, labor, equipment, material or 8 9 repairs in excess of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) shall be 10 awarded by public trusts to the lowest and best competitive bidder, 11 pursuant to public invitation to bid, which shall be published in 12 the manner provided in the preceding section hereof; the 13 advertisements shall appear in the county where the work, or the major part of it, is to be done, or the equipment or materials are 14 15 to be delivered, or the services are to be rendered; provided, however, should the trustee or the trustees find that an immediate 16 emergency exists, which findings shall be entered in the journal of 17 the trust proceedings, by reason of which an immediate outlay of 18 trust funds in an amount exceeding Fifty Thousand Dollars 19 (\$50,000.00) Seventy-five Thousand Dollars (\$75,000.00) is necessary 20 in order to avoid loss of life, substantial damage to property, or 21 damage to the public peace or safety, then the contracts may be made 22 and entered into without public notice or competitive bids; provided 23 that the provisions of this subsection shall not apply to contracts 24

of industrial and cultural trusts. Notwithstanding the provisions of this subsection, equipment or materials may be purchased by a public trust directly from any contract duly awarded by this state or any state agency under The Oklahoma Central Purchasing Act, or from any contract duly awarded by a governmental entity which is the beneficiary of the public trust.

7 Any public trust created pursuant to the provisions of this J. section shall have the power to acquire lands by use of eminent 8 9 domain in the same manner and according to the procedures provided 10 for in Sections 51 through 65 of Title 66 of the Oklahoma Statutes. 11 Any exercise of the power of eminent domain by a public trust 12 pursuant to the provisions of this section shall be limited to the furtherance of public purpose projects involving revenue-producing 13 utility projects of which the public trust retains ownership; 14 15 provided, for public trusts in which the State of Oklahoma is the 16 beneficiary the exercise of the power of eminent domain may also be used for public purpose projects involving air transportation. 17 Revenue-producing utility projects shall be limited to projects for 18 the transportation, delivery, treatment, or furnishing of water for 19 domestic purposes or for power, including, but not limited to, the 20 construction of lakes, pipelines, and water treatment plants or for 21 projects for rail transportation. counselor, and information regarding the number of counselors
 employed per elementary school, middle school, junior high school

C. Except as otherwise provided by subsection A of this section
with regard to curricular standards, as a condition of receiving

been denied a charter by the local school district in which it seeks
to operate. In counties with fewer than five hundred thousand

1 (500,000) population, according to the latest Federal Decennial 2 Census, the State Board of Education shall not sponsor more than 3 five charter schools per year each year for the first five (5) years 4 after the effective date of this act, with not more than one charter 5 school sponsored in a single school district per year. In order to 6 authorize a charter school under this section, the State Board of 7 Education shall find evidence of all of the following:

- a. a thorough and high-quality charter school application
 from the applicant based on the authorizing standards
 in subsection B of Section 3-134 of this title,
 b. a clear demonstration of community support for the
- 12 charter school, and
- c. the grounds and basis of objection by the school
 district for denying the operation of the charter are
 not supported by the greater weight of evidence and
 the strength of the application.

B. An eligible non-school-district sponsor shall give priority
to opening charter schools that serve at-risk student populations or
students from low-performing traditional public schools.

20 C. An eligible non-school-district sponsor shall give priority 21 to applicants that have demonstrated a record of operating at least 22 one school or similar program that demonstrates academic success and 23 organizational viability and serves student populations similar to 24 those the proposed charter school seeks to serve. In assessing the potential for quality replication of a charter school, a sponsor shall consider the following factors before approving a new site or school:

Evidence of a strong and reliable record of academic success
 based primarily on student performance data, as well as other viable
 indicators, including financial and operational success;

2. A sound, detailed, and well-supported growth plan;

8 3. Evidence of the ability to transfer successful practices to
9 a potentially different context that includes reproducing critical
10 cultural, organizational and instructional characteristics;

4. Any management organization involved in a potential replication is fully vetted, and the academic, financial and operational records of the schools it operates are found to be satisfactory;

15 5. Evidence the program seeking to be replicated has the 16 capacity to do so successfully without diminishing or putting at 17 risk its current operations; and

6. A financial structure that ensures that funds attributable
to each charter school within a network and required by law to be
utilized by a school remain with and are used to benefit that
school.

D. For purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act, "charter school" means a public school established by contract with a board of education of a school district, an area vocational-technical

school district, a higher education institution, a federally
 recognized Indian tribe, or the State Board of Education pursuant to
 the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act to provide learning that will
 improve student achievement and as defined in the Elementary and
 Secondary Education Act of 1965, 20 U.S.C. 8065.

E. 1. For the purposes of the Oklahoma Charter Schools Act,
"conversion school" means a school created by converting all or any
part of a traditional public school in order to access any or all
flexibilities afforded to a charter school.

Prior to the board of education of a school district 10 2. 11 converting all or any part of a traditional public school to a 12 conversion school, the board shall prepare a conversion plan. The 13 conversion plan shall include documentation that demonstrates and complies with paragraphs 1, 2, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 14 15 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24, 34 and 35 of subsection B of Section 3-134 16 of this title. The conversion plan and all documents shall be in writing and shall be available to the public pursuant to the 17 requirements of the Oklahoma Open Records Act. All votes by the 18 board of education of a school district to approve a conversion plan 19 shall be held in an open public session. If the board of education 20 of a school district votes to approve a conversion plan, the board 21 shall notify the State Board of Education within sixty (60) days 22 after the vote. The notification shall include a copy of the 23

minutes for the board meeting at which the conversion plan was
 approved.

3 3. A conversion school shall comply with all the same accountability measures as are required of a charter school as 4 5 defined in subsection D of this section. The provisions of Sections 3-140 and 3-142 of this title shall not apply to a conversion 6 7 school. Conversion schools shall comply with the same laws and State Board of Education rules relating to student enrollment which 8 9 apply to traditional public schools. Conversion schools shall be 10 funded by the board of education of the school district as a school 11 site within the school district and funding shall not be affected by 12 the conversion of the school.

4. The board of education of a school district may vote to
revert a conversion school back to a traditional public school at
any time; provided, the change shall only occur during a break
between school years.

17 5. Unless otherwise provided for in this subsection, a
18 conversion school shall retain the characteristics of a traditional
19 public school.

F. A charter school may consist of a new school site, new school sites or all or any portion of an existing school site. An entire school district may not become a charter school site.

D. The State Board of Education may grant an exception to the requirements for certification and, upon demonstration by an individual of specific competency in the subject area of specialization, may grant a certificate to the individual. 7 E. Student teaching and a prestudent teaching field experience
8 shall not be required of alternative placement program participants
9 for standard certification.

F. The State Board of Education shall promulgate rules authorizing adjunct teachers who shall be persons with distinguished qualifications in their field. Adjunct teachers shall not be required to meet standard certification. SECTION 39. AMENDATORY 82 O.S. 2011, Section 862, as last amended by Section 2, Chapter 297, O.S.L. 2016 (82 O.S. Supp. 2016, Section 862), is amended to read as follows:

Section 862. The district shall have and is hereby authorized to exercise the following powers, rights and privileges:

To control, store and preserve, within the boundaries of the
 district, the waters of Grand River and its tributaries, for any
 useful purpose, and to use, distribute and sell the same within the
 boundaries of the district; provided, however, that any municipal
 corporation within the area included within the jurisdiction of the

Grand River Dam Authority shall be entitled to take water from the Grand River and any of its tributaries in any quantities that may be needed by such municipal corporation;

2. To develop and generate water power, electric power and 4 5 electric energy, from whatever source, within the boundaries of the district; to acquire coal or other minerals to be used for the 6 7 purposes of providing energy sources for electrical generating plants; to acquire or lease any and all railroad connections, 8 9 equipment, rolling stock, trackage and otherwise, necessary to the 10 transporting of coal and other minerals to generating plant sites 11 within the district; and to buy, sell, resell, interchange and 12 distribute electric power and energy in order to carry forward the 13 business and functions of the district now or hereafter authorized by law and may enter into contracts for such purposes, such 14 15 contracts to run for a period of not to exceed fifty (50) years 16 except those contracts provided for in paragraphs 6 and 7 of this section. All contracts may contain such reasonable provisions, 17 limitations, qualifications, protective clauses and rights and 18 obligations of purchase and sale, and such provisions for the 19 dedication of the use of facilities and the construction of 20 additional facilities to serve the load requirements of all the 21 parties as may be deemed advisable by the district to safequard the 22 business and properties of all the parties to such contracts, all 23 within the limits of sound business judgment and practice, good 24

1 conscience, and not contrary to the public policy of the state. The 2 district is further authorized to participate in the Southwest Power 3 Pool Integrated Marketplace or any other program established by a Federal Energy Regulatory Commission authorized Regional 4 5 Transmission Organization in which the district is a member and to engage in the buying and selling of electricity products, fuel 6 7 commodities, and financial instruments as deemed necessary and prudent by the district and specifically excludes any expansion of 8 9 retail activities of the district. The Board of Directors shall 10 adopt a hedging policy to enable the district to take advantage of 11 standard market products to reduce risk while preventing speculative 12 trading and potential abuses;

To prevent or aid in the prevention of damage to person or

4. To forest and reforest and to aid in the foresting and
reforesting of the watershed area of the Grand River and its
tributaries and to prevent and to aid in the prevention of soil

To acquire by purchase, lease, gift, or in any other manner, 20 and to maintain, use and operate or to contract for the maintenance, 21 use and operation of any and all property of any kind, real, 22 personal, or mixed, or any interest therein, including trucks of any 23 size or weight and passenger vehicles and to own, construct, operate 24 and maintain any project or works in conjunction or jointly with, as

1 tenants in common, any public or private corporation duly authorized 2 and qualified to do business within this state including, but not 3 limited to, rural electric cooperatives of the State of Oklahoma or the United States of America, or any department, subdivision or 4 5 agency of the State of Oklahoma or the United States of America, or with any "public agency" as defined under the Interlocal Cooperation 6 Act, within or without the boundaries of the district, necessary, 7 incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights, 8 9 privileges and functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam 10 Authority Act;

6. In addition to any other powers conferred, the district 11 12 shall have power and authority to participate and enter into agreements with any public or private corporation duly authorized 13 and qualified to do business within the State of Oklahoma including, 14 15 but not limited to, rural electric cooperatives, the state or the United States of America or any department, subdivision or agency of 16 17 the state or the United States of America, or with any "public agency" as defined under the Interlocal Cooperation Act, for the 18 purpose of planning, acquiring, financing, owning, operating and 19 maintaining an undivided ownership of any steam, oil, gas, coal-20 fired, thermal, geothermal, solar, waste or refuse reclamation 21 powered electric generating plant or plants or any facilities of 22 every kind necessary, incidental or convenient for the production, 23 generation and transmission of electric power and energy including, 24

1 but not limited to, any and all related transmission facilities, 2 which shall be used as common facilities. The agreements shall 3 provide that the district and any participants therein shall have the incidents of tenant in common to any plant or facility. 4 Ιt 5 shall also be provided in the agreements that the district and any 6 participant in the project shall own a percentage of any common 7 facility equal to the percentage of the money furnished or the value of property supplied by it for the acquisition and construction 8 9 thereof and shall own and control a like percentage of the 10 electrical output thereof.

Each participant shall defray its own interest payments and 11 12 other payments required to be made or deposited in connection with any financing undertaken by it to pay its percentage of the money 13 furnished or value of property supplied by it for the planning, 14 15 acquisition and construction of any common facility, or any additions or betterments thereto. The agreement shall further 16 provide a uniform method of determining and allocating operation and 17 maintenance expenses of the common facility. 18

In carrying out the powers granted in this section, the district and each participant shall be severally liable only for its own acts and not jointly or severally liable for the acts, omissions or obligations of others. No money or property supplied by the district or any participant for the planning, financing, acquiring, constructing, operating or maintaining of any common plant or 1 facility shall be credited or otherwise applied to the account of 2 any other participant therein, nor shall the undivided share of the 3 district or any participant therein be charged, directly or indirectly, with any debt or obligation of any other participant or 4 5 be subject to any lien as a result thereof. No action in connection with a common facility shall be binding upon the district except as 6 7 expressly authorized and provided for in the participation 8 agreement;

9 7. In addition to the powers conferred in paragraph 6 of this 10 section, the district shall have power and authority to participate 11 and enter into agreements with any public or private corporation 12 duly authorized and qualified to do business within this state including, but not limited to, rural electric cooperatives, the 13 State of Oklahoma or the United States of America or any department, 14 15 subdivision or agency of the State of Oklahoma or the United States of America, or with any "public agency" as defined under the 16 Interlocal Cooperation Act, for the purpose of planning, acquiring, 17 financing, owning, operating and maintaining undivided ownership 18 interests in any steam, oil, gas, coal-fired, thermal, geothermal, 19 solar, waste or refuse reclamation powered electric generating plant 20 or plants or any other facilities of every kind necessary, 21 incidental or convenient for the production, generation and 22 transmission of electric power and energy including, but not limited 23 to, any and all related transmission or other facilities which are 24

1 to be used as common facilities and to cooperate with other state 2 agencies and public trusts to promote economic development in the 3 state and to assist in attracting industry to the state. Such undivided ownership interests may be created by an agreement entered 4 5 into with respect to property to be acquired by the district. Any such agreement may be a sale agreement, with the purchase price 6 payable at one time or in installments at such time and over such 7 period as shall be agreed to by the parties thereto, a lease 8 9 agreement, with a nominal purchase option, or any other type of 10 agreement. In addition to the purchase price, the district shall be 11 fully indemnified as to operation, maintenance, administrative and 12 other expenses incurred with respect to such undivided interest. Any payment received in respect to any such agreement shall be 13 deemed revenues of the Authority. The district is hereby authorized 14 15 to enter into any such agreement in order to sell, lease or otherwise convey undivided ownership interests in any such property. 16 Any such agreement shall specify the undivided interest to be owned 17 or acquired by each of the participants, provide for a waiver of 18 partition, prescribe the time of vesting of such interest and the 19 amount of electrical output to be owned and controlled by any 20 participant. 21

Each participant shall defray its own interest and other payments required to be made or deposited in connection with any financing undertaken by it to pay its percentage of the money 1 furnished or value of property supplied by it for the planning, 2 acquisition and construction of any common facility, or any 3 additions or betterments thereto. The agreement shall provide a 4 uniform method of determining and allocating operation and 5 maintenance expenses of the common facility.

In carrying out the powers granted in this section, the district 6 7 and each participant shall be severally liable only for its own acts and not jointly or severally liable for the acts, omissions or 8 9 obligations of others. No money or property supplied by the 10 district or any participant for the planning, financing, acquiring, 11 constructing, operating or maintaining of any common plant or 12 facility shall be credited or otherwise applied to the account of any other participant therein, nor shall the undivided share of the 13 district or any participant therein be charged, directly or 14 15 indirectly, with any debt or obligation of any other participant or be subject to any lien as a result thereof. No action in connection 16 with a common facility shall be binding upon the district except as 17 expressly authorized and provided for in the participation 18 19 agreement;

To acquire by condemnation any and all property of any kind, real, personal, or mixed, or any interest therein, within or without the boundaries of the district, necessary, incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights, privileges and functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam Authority Act, in the

1 manner provided by general law with respect to condemnation; 2 provided that nothing in the Grand River Dam Authority Act shall 3 ever be construed to authorize the district to acquire by condemnation any privately, municipally or publicly owned electric 4 5 public utility system or any part thereof outside of the high-water mark of a reservoir area or outside a properly located damsite, 6 7 except the districts may require the relocation of transmission lines and substations so owned where such relocation is necessary 8 9 for the construction and maintenance of dams, reservoirs, levees, 10 spillways and floodways, and in such event just compensation shall be paid. Provided that the Grand River Dam Authority shall have the 11 12 right to cross transmission lines of other electric utility 13 companies under proper engineering standards of construction as approved by the Corporation Commission; 14

to, an installment sale agreement, lease with nominal purchase

To overflow and inundate any public lands and public 22 property and to require the relocation of roads and highways in the 23 manner and to the extent necessary to carry out the purposes of the 24 Grand River Dam Authority Act; provided, that the district shall be 1 liable in damages to the State of Oklahoma or any subdivision 2 thereof for any injury occasioned or expense incurred by reason 3 thereof;

11. To construct, extend, improve, maintain and reconstruct, to
cause to be constructed, extended, improved, maintained and
reconstructed, and to use and operate any and all facilities of any
kind necessary, incidental or convenient to the exercise of such
powers, rights, privileges and functions;

To sue and be sued in its corporate name in contracts, reverse condemnation, tort, equity, mandamus and similar actions and 10 11 in its own name plead and be impleaded, provided, however, that any 12 and all actions of law or in an equity against the district shall be brought in the county in which the principal office of the district 13 shall be located or in the county where the cause of action arose; 14 15 13. To adopt, use and alter a corporate seal;

To appoint officers, agents and employees, to prescribe 19 their duties and to fix their compensation; and enter into contracts 20 with labor unions, provided, that contracts with labor unions shall 21 not abrogate the rights of the district to cooperate and carry out 22 Veterans on the Job Training;

16. To make contracts and to execute instruments necessary,incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights,

privileges and functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam
 Authority Act;

3 To borrow money for its corporate purposes and, without 17. limitation of the generality of the foregoing, to borrow money and 4 5 accept grants from the United States of America, or from any corporation or agency created or designated by the United States of 6 7 America, and, in connection with any such loan or grant, to enter into such agreements as the United States of America or such 8 9 corporation or agency may require; and to make and issue its 10 negotiable bonds for money borrowed, in the manner provided in the 11 Grand River Dam Authority Act. Nothing in the Grand River Dam 12 Authority Act shall authorize the issuance of any bonds, notes or 13 other evidences of indebtedness of the district, except as specifically provided in the Grand River Dam Authority Act; 14

15 18. To prescribe and enforce rules for the use for recreational 16 and commercial purposes of the lakes created by the district by 17 impounding the waters of the lakes, and the shorelands of the district bordering thereon, including the use of firearms, the 18 inspection of all boats of every character proposing to operate or 19 operating on the lakes, the issuance of permits for the operation of 20 boats, surfboards, aquaplanes, sea-skis or similar devices on the 21 lakes for hire; the charging and collection of fees for the 22 inspection or operation of such boats, surfboards, aquaplanes, sea-23 skis or other similar devices on the lakes for hire; preventing the 24

1 launching or operation of any commercial or for-hire boat, 2 surfboard, aquaplane, sea-ski or similar device for hire, on the waters of the lakes, without a certificate of inspection and a 3 permit for such use; prescribing the type, style, location and 4 5 equipment of all wharves, docks and anchorages along the shores and upon the water of the lakes; the issuance of permits for wharfage, 6 7 dock or anchorage privileges and charging fees for such commercial or private permits; and the establishment and maintenance of public 8 9 wharves, docks or anchorages and the charging and collection of fees 10 for the use thereof by the public; to appoint or employ such persons, including CLEET-certified volunteer reserve officers, as 11 12 the district may deem proper and suitable for the purpose of 13 enforcing such rules and regulations as may be issued hereunder, or as may be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Oklahoma Boating 14 15 Safety Regulation Act, and for the enforcing of the provisions of the Grand River Dam Authority Act, and all violations of criminal 16 laws occurring within the boundaries of the counties where real 17 property owned or leased by the Grand River Dam Authority is 18 located, which employees shall have the power of peace officers 19 during the performance of those duties, except in the serving or 20 execution of civil process. 21

Any municipal, county or state law enforcement officer employed by the Grand River Dam Authority to serve as a part-time or seasonal commissioned peace officer shall be exempt from the restrictions on dual office holding as provided for in paragraph 16 of subsection A
 of Section 6 of Title 51 of the Oklahoma Statutes;

3 To do any and all other acts or things necessary, 19. incidental or convenient to the exercise of the powers, rights, 4 5 privileges or functions conferred upon it by the Grand River Dam Authority Act or any other act or law. Provided the district shall 6 7 be liable for damage caused by the district, its agents, servants and employees in creating, constructing, maintaining or operating 8 9 the district to any corporation, partnership, person or individual 10 whose property, either real or personal, within or without said 11 district, has been damaged and the damages may be determined by 12 appropriate action as provided by law. Nothing in the Grand River Dam Authority Act shall be construed as rendering the district 13 liable for damage where it is not liable on general principles of 14 law or statute or Constitutional provision. 15

To support and assist the efforts of state, regional and local development organizations, political subdivisions, industrial 4 5 committees, chambers of commerce, tourism organizations, agricultural organizations, environmental organizations and other 6 7 similar public and private agencies to obtain new and foster expansion of existing service, industrial and manufacturing 8 9 facilities, businesses and enterprises to enhance the quality of life for the citizens of the district and the state. Provided, 10 11 support and assistance shall be limited to an amount not to exceed a 12 total of Twenty-five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) per year for one 13 or more projects or efforts that are for the benefit of or impact the quality of life for each city or community located within the 14 boundaries of the district; and 15

16 21. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the General Manager, department heads and other essential employees of the 17 district, as designated by the General Manager, may be permitted to 18 use a district owned vehicle to provide transportation between the 19 employee's residence and the assigned place of employment and 20 between the residence and any location other than the assigned place 21 of employment to which the employee travels in the performance of 22 the employee's official duty. 23
