11 12	This amendment, which is one of 2 reports of the committee, makes the following changes to the bill.

It requires that a federally licensed firearms dealer's facilitation of a sale, transfer or exchange of a firearm be conducted in the same manner as if the dealer were selling the firearm from the dealer's own inventory and in a manner that complies with all applicable requirements of state and federal laws and regulations. It also provides that a seller may satisfy that requirement by obtaining a criminal background check of the buyer through a law enforcement agency that agrees to conduct the criminal background check.
19	2. It removes the limitations on the type of transactions to which the bill applies.
20 21 22 23 24 25	3. It removes the provision that makes it a Class D crime when a person knowingly sells, transfers or exchanges a firearm without conducting a criminal background check and has one or more convictions for the same offense. The amendment provides that a seller who knowingly sells, transfers or exchanges a firearm in violation of the requirements of this legislation commits a civil violation for which a fine of not more than \$1,000 may be imposed.
