13 Be it enacted by the people of the State of Nebraska,

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Section 1. Section 9-812, Revised Statutes Cumulative Supplement,
 2014, is amended to read:

3 9-812 (1) All money received from the operation of lottery games conducted pursuant to the State Lottery Act in Nebraska shall be credited 4 to the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund, which fund is hereby created. 5 All payments of the costs of establishing and maintaining the lottery 6 7 games shall be made from the State Lottery Operation Cash Fund. In accordance with legislative appropriations, money for payments for 8 expenses of the division shall be transferred from the State Lottery 9 Operation Trust Fund to the State Lottery Operation Cash Fund, which fund 10 is hereby created. All money necessary for the payment of lottery prizes 11 shall be transferred from the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the 12 State Lottery Prize Trust Fund, which fund is hereby created. The amount 13 used for the payment of lottery prizes shall not be less than forty 14 percent of the dollar amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold. 15

16 (2) A portion of the dollar amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold on an annualized basis shall be transferred from the State 17 Lottery Operation Trust Fund to the Education Innovation Fund, the 18 Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund, the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund, 19 the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, the Nebraska State Fair Board, and 20 the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund as provided in subsection (3) of 21 this section. The dollar amount transferred pursuant to this subsection 22 23 shall equal the greater of (a) the dollar amount transferred to the funds 24 in fiscal year 2002-03 or (b) any amount which constitutes at least 25 twenty-two percent and no more than twenty-five percent of the dollar amount of the lottery tickets which have been sold on an annualized 26 basis. To the extent that funds are available, the Tax Commissioner and 27 director may authorize a transfer exceeding twenty-five percent of the 28 dollar amount of the lottery tickets sold on an annualized basis. 29

30 (3) Of the money available to be transferred to the Education31 Innovation Fund, the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund, the Nebraska

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Education Improvement Fund, the Nebraska Environmental Trust Fund, the
 Nebraska State Fair Board, and the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund:

3 (a) The first five hundred thousand dollars shall be transferred to
4 the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund to be used as provided in section
5 9-1006;

6 (b) Beginning July 1, 2016, forty-four and one-half percent of the 7 money remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and 8 the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be 9 transferred to the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund;

10 (c) Through June 30, 2016, nineteen and three-fourths percent of the 11 money remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses and 12 the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be 13 transferred to the Education Innovation Fund;

(d) Through June 30, 2016, twenty-four and three-fourths percent of 14 the money remaining after the payment of prizes and operating expenses 15 and the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall 16 17 be transferred to the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Fund. The Legislature finds that the Nebraska Opportunity Grant Program is an important state 18 19 program and that the allocation from the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund should be fully replaced with funding from the General Fund, 20 provided through the state budgeting process pursuant to the budget 21 requests submitted by the Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary 22 Education; 23

(e) Forty-four and one-half percent of the money remaining after the
payment of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the
Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Nebraska
Environmental Trust Fund to be used as provided in the Nebraska
Environmental Trust Act;

(f) Ten percent of the money remaining after the payment of prizes
and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive
Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Nebraska State Fair

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1 Board if the most populous city within the county in which the fair is 2 located provides matching funds equivalent to ten percent of the funds available for transfer. Such matching funds may be obtained from the city 3 4 and any other private or public entity, except that no portion of such 5 matching funds shall be provided by the state. If the Nebraska State Fair ceases operations, ten percent of the money remaining after the payment 6 7 of prizes and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the General 8 9 Fund; and

(g) One percent of the money remaining after the payment of prizes
and operating expenses and the initial transfer to the Compulsive
Gamblers Assistance Fund shall be transferred to the Compulsive Gamblers
Assistance Fund to be used as provided in section 9-1006.

(4)(a) The Education Innovation Fund is created. At least seventyfive percent of the lottery proceeds allocated to the Education
Innovation Fund shall be available for disbursement.

17 (b) For fiscal year 2013-14, the Education Innovation Fund shall be 18 allocated as follows: (i) The first one million dollars shall be 19 transferred to the Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; (ii) the next allocation shall be distributed 20 21 to local systems as grants for approved accelerated or differentiated 22 curriculum programs for students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to section 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount 23 24 distributed in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the 25 basic allowable growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) up to the next one hundred sixty thousand dollars shall be used by the State 26 27 Department of Education to implement section 79-759; (iv) the next one 28 million seven hundred fifty thousand dollars shall be allocated to early childhood education grants awarded by the department pursuant to section 29 30 79-1103; (v) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to the Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to section 31

1 79-1104.02; (vi) the next two hundred thousand dollars shall be used to 2 provide grants to establish bridge programs pursuant to sections 79-1189 3 to 79-1195; (vii) the next ten thousand dollars shall be used to fund the 4 Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children; 5 (viii) the next eighty-five thousand five hundred fifty dollars shall be 6 allocated to the State Department of Education for distribution pursuant 7 to section 79-2306; and (ix) the amount remaining shall be allocated, after administrative expenses, for distance education equipment and 8 9 incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 and 79-1337. No funds received as 10 allocations from the Education Innovation Fund pursuant to this subdivision may be obligated for payment to be made after June 30, 2016. 11

(b ϵ) For fiscal year 2014-15, the Education Innovation Fund shall 12 be allocated, after administrative expenses, as follows: (i) The first 13 one million two hundred thousand dollars shall be transferred to the 14 Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; 15 (ii) the next allocation shall be distributed to local systems as grants 16 for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs for 17 students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to section 18 19 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable 20 growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) the next one million eight 21 22 hundred fifty thousand dollars shall be allocated to early childhood 23 education grants awarded by the State Department of Education pursuant to 24 section 79-1103; (iv) the next one million dollars shall be transferred 25 to the Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to section 79-1104.02; (v) the next two hundred thousand dollars shall be 26 used to provide grants to establish bridge programs pursuant to sections 27 79-1189 to 79-1195; (vi) the next ten thousand dollars shall be used to 28 fund the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military 29 Children; (vii) the next two million dollars shall be allocated for 30 distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to sections 79-1336 31

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and 79-1337; (viii) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to 1 2 the School District Reorganization Fund; (ix) up to the next one hundred forty-five thousand dollars shall be used by the State Department of 3 4 Education to implement section 79-759; and (x) the next three hundred thirty-five thousand dollars shall be allocated to local systems as 5 grants awarded by the State Department of Education to assist schools in 6 7 evaluating and improving career education programs to align such programs with the state's economic and workforce needs. Except for funds 8 9 transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund, the Early 10 Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund, or the department for early childhood education grants pursuant to section 79-1103, no funds received 11 as allocations from the Education Innovation Fund pursuant to this 12 13 subdivision may be obligated for payment to be made after June 30, 2016, 14 and such funds received as transfers or allocations from the Education Innovation Fund that have not been used for their designated purpose as 15 16 of such date shall be transferred to the Nebraska Education Improvement 17 Fund on or before August 1, 2016.

(c d) For fiscal year 2015-16, the Education Innovation Fund shall 18 be allocated, after administrative expenses, as follows: (i) The first 19 one million two hundred thousand dollars shall be transferred to the 20 Excellence in Teaching Cash Fund to fund the Excellence in Teaching Act; 21 (ii) the next allocation shall be distributed to local systems as grants 22 for approved accelerated or differentiated curriculum programs for 23 24 students identified as learners with high ability pursuant to section 25 79-1108.02 in an aggregated amount up to the amount distributed in the prior fiscal year for such purposes increased by the basic allowable 26 growth rate pursuant to section 79-1025; (iii) the next one million nine 27 28 hundred fifty thousand dollars shall be allocated to early childhood education grants awarded by the State Department of Education pursuant to 29 section 79-1103; (iv) the next one million dollars shall be transferred 30 to the Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund for use pursuant to 31

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section 79-1104.02; (v) the next ten thousand dollars shall be used to 1 2 fund the Interstate Compact on Educational Opportunity for Military Children; (vi) the next two million five hundred thousand dollars shall 3 4 be allocated for distance education equipment and incentives pursuant to 5 sections 79-1336 and 79-1337; (vii) the next one million dollars shall be transferred to the School District Reorganization Fund; (viii) up to the 6 7 next one hundred forty-five thousand dollars shall be used by the State Department of Education to implement section 79-759; and (ix) of the 8 9 amount remaining, (A) three million dollars shall be retained in the 10 Education Innovation Fund to transfer to the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on June 30, 2016, and (B) the remaining amount shall be 11 allocated to local systems as grants awarded by the State Department of 12 13 Education to assist schools in evaluating and improving career education 14 programs to align such programs with the state's economic and workforce needs. Except for funds transferred to the School District Reorganization 15 Fund, the Early Childhood Education Endowment Cash Fund, or the 16 17 department for early childhood education grants pursuant to section 79-1103, no funds received as allocations from the Education Innovation 18 19 Fund pursuant to this subdivision may be obligated for payment to be made after June 30, 2016, and such funds received as transfers or allocations 20 from the Education Innovation Fund that have not been used for their 21 22 designated purpose as of such date shall be transferred to the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on or before August 1, 2016. 23

(e) The Education Innovation Fund terminates on June 30, 2016. Any money in the fund on such date shall be transferred to the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund on such date. <u>The Legislature finds that the</u> programs funded by the Education Innovation Fund immediately prior to its termination should continue as state programs with funding from the General Fund, provided through the state budgeting process pursuant to the budget requests submitted by the State Department of Education.

31 (5) The Nebraska Education Improvement Fund is created. The fund

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shall consist of money transferred pursuant to subsections (3) and (4) of 1 2 this section, money transferred pursuant to section 85-1920, and any 3 other funds appropriated by the Legislature. The fund shall be allocated 4 as provided in this section for fiscal years 2016-17 through 2026-27. On or before December 31, 2025, the Education Committee of the Legislature 5 shall electronically submit recommendations to the Clerk of the 6 7 Legislature regarding how the fund should be allocated to best advance the educational priorities of the state for the following ten-year 8 9 period. For fiscal years 2016-17 through 2026-27, ten percent of the 10 available balance for any fiscal year shall be retained in the fund with ninety percent of the fund allocated as follows: Any money in the fund 11 12 available for investment shall be invested by the state investment officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion Act and the Nebraska 13 14 State Funds Investment Act. (a) Forty percent of the allocated funds to the State Board of 15

16 Education for competitive innovation grants pursuant to section 2 of this 17 <u>act;</u>

(b) Forty percent of the allocated funds to the Coordinating
 Commission for Postsecondary Education for competitive innovation grants
 pursuant to section 3 of this act;

(c) Ten percent of the allocated funds to the State Board of
 Education to assist high school students pursuant to section 4 of this
 act with postsecondary and certification costs associated with trade
 occupations that are experiencing shortages of qualified workers; and

25 (d) Ten percent of the allocated funds to the Coordinating 26 Commission for Postsecondary Education to assist students attending 27 community colleges pursuant to section 5 of this act with postsecondary 28 and certification costs associated with trade occupations that are 29 experiencing shortages of qualified workers.

30 (6) Any money in the State Lottery Operation Trust Fund, the State
 31 Lottery Operation Cash Fund, the State Lottery Prize Trust Fund, <u>the</u>

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<u>Nebraska Education Improvement Fund,</u> or the Education Innovation Fund
 available for investment shall be invested by the state investment
 officer pursuant to the Nebraska Capital Expansion Act and the Nebraska
 State Funds Investment Act.

5 (7) Unclaimed prize money on a winning lottery ticket shall be 6 retained for a period of time prescribed by rules and regulations. If no 7 claim is made within such period, the prize money shall be used at the 8 discretion of the Tax Commissioner for any of the purposes prescribed in 9 this section.

10 Sec. 2. (1) The State Board of Education shall establish a competitive innovation grant program with funding from the Nebraska 11 Education Improvement Fund. Grantees shall be a school district, an 12 educational service unit, or a combination of entities that includes at 13 least one school district or educational service unit. For grantees that 14 consist of a combination of entities, a participating school district or 15 educational service unit shall be designated to act as the fiscal agent 16 17 and administer the program funded by the grant. The state board shall only award grants pursuant to applications that the board deems to be 18 19 sufficiently innovative and to have a high chance of success.

20 (2) An application for a grant pursuant to subsection (1) of this
 21 section shall describe:

22 (a) Specific measurable objectives for improving education outcomes 23 for early childhood students, elementary students, middle school 24 students, or high school students or for improving the transitions 25 between any successive stages of education or between education and the 26 workforce;

27 (b) The method for annually evaluating progress toward a measurable
28 objective, with the final evaluation due six months prior to the end of
29 the grant period;

30 (c) The potential for the project to be both scalable and
 31 replicable; and

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1	<u>(d) Any cost savings that could be achieved by reductions in other</u>
2	programs if the funded program is successful.
3	(3) Following the final evaluation for each grant, the State Board
4	of Education shall recommend the grant project as:
5	(a) Representing a best practice;
6	<u>(b) A model for a state-supported program; or</u>
7	<u>(c) A local issue for further study.</u>
8	(4) For grant projects that are recommended as best practices after
9	receiving a grant for four years, the State Board of Education may
10	establish criteria allowing such best practices to be included in the
11	best practices allowance to school districts pursuant to section 8 of
12	this act. The criteria shall:
13	<u>(a) Specify qualifications for a school district to participate in</u>
14	the best practices allowance for each best practice to be included in the
15	<u>allowance;</u>
16	<u>(b) Specify a best practices dollar amount based on eighty-five</u>
17	percent of the estimated costs related to each best practice included in
18	the allowance that would not otherwise be incurred without the best
19	practice and that do not replace other such costs;
20	<u>(c) Specify an accountability process which will result in a future</u>
21	<u>aid correction if a school district is found to be in violation of any of</u>
22	the qualifications; and
23	(d) Specify any other criteria deemed relevant by the state board.
24	<u>(5) On or before November 1 of each year for which the best</u>
25	practices allowance has been implemented, the department shall certify to
26	each qualifying school district the amount of the best practices cost
27	<u>pursuant to this section for such school district and the total best</u>
28	practices cost for all qualifying school districts to be included in the
29	calculation of state aid for the next school fiscal year.
30	<u>(6) On or before December 1 of each odd-numbered year, the state</u>
31	board shall electronically submit a report to the Clerk of the

Legislature on all such grants, including, but not limited to, the results of the evaluations for each grant and on the best practices allowance if the allowance has been implemented. No more than five percent of the funds received from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund shall be retained for administration. The state board may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out this section.

7 Sec. 3. (1) The Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education shall establish a competitive innovation grant program with funding from 8 9 the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund. Grantees shall be a public 10 postsecondary education institution or combination of entities that includes at least one public postsecondary education institution. For 11 grantees that consist of a combination of entities, a participating 12 13 public postsecondary education institution shall be designated to act as the fiscal agent and administer the program funded by the grant. The 14 15 commission shall only award grants pursuant to applications that the commission deems to be sufficiently innovative and to have a high chance 16 17 of success.

18 (2) Applications shall describe:

<u>(a) Specific measurable objectives for improving postsecondary</u>
 <u>education or transition into postsecondary education or into the</u>
 <u>workforce;</u>

22 (b) The method for annually evaluating progress toward a measurable
23 objective, with the final evaluation due six months prior to the end of
24 the grant;

25 (c) The potential for the project to be both scalable and 26 <u>replicable; and</u>

27 (d) Any cost savings that could be achieved by reductions in other
 28 programs if the funded program is successful.

29 (3) Following the final evaluation for each grant, the commission
 30 shall recommend the grant project as:

31 (a) Representing a best practice;

1 (b) A model for a state-supported program; or 2 (c) An institutional issue for further study. 3 (4) On or before December 1 of each odd-numbered year, the 4 commission shall electronically submit a report to the Clerk of the 5 Legislature on all such grants, including, but not limited to, the results of the evaluations for each grant. No more than five percent of 6 7 the funds received from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund shall be retained for administration. The commission may adopt and promulgate 8 9 rules and regulations to carry out this section. 10 Sec. 4. The State Board of Education shall establish a program with funding from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund to provide 11 assistance to high school students for postsecondary education and 12 13 certification costs associated with obtaining credentials for trade occupations that are experiencing shortages of gualified workers as 14

identified by the Department of Labor pursuant to section 6 of this act. 15 A high school student who begins a course of study for a trade occupation 16 17 that is on the list described in such section at such time shall continue to be eligible for assistance pursuant to this section for such course of 18 19 study until the student graduates from high school or otherwise ceases to be a high school student in Nebraska. No more than five percent of the 20 funds received from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund shall be 21 retained for administration. The state board may adopt and promulgate 22 23 rules and regulations to carry out this section.

24 Sec. 5. The Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education 25 shall establish a program with funding from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund to provide assistance to community college students for 26 27 postsecondary education and certification costs associated with obtaining 28 credentials for trade occupations that are on the list described in section 6 of this act. A community college student who begins a course of 29 study for a trade occupation that is on the list described in such 30 section at such time shall continue to be eligible for assistance 31

pursuant to this section for such course of study for a period of three years or until the student completes such course of study, whichever occurs first. No more than five percent of the funds received from the Nebraska Education Improvement Fund shall be retained for administration. The Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education may adopt and promulgate rules and regulations to carry out this section.

7 On or before December 31 of each year, the Department of Sec. 6. Labor shall certify to the State Department of Education and the 8 9 Coordinating Commission for Postsecondary Education a list of trade 10 occupations that are experiencing shortages of qualified workers for use in providing assistance to students during the immediately following 11 fiscal year pursuant to sections 4 and 5 of this act for postsecondary 12 13 education and certification costs associated with obtaining credentials. The list shall include the specific coursework, certifications, or other 14 15 postsecondary credentials sought by employers and for which there is a shortage for each listed trade occupation. 16

Sec. 7. Section 79-1001, Reissue Revised Statutes of Nebraska, is amended to read:

79-1001 Sections 79-1001 to 79-1033 <u>and section 8 of this act shall</u>
be known and may be cited as the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities
Support Act.

22 For any school fiscal year for which the best practices Sec. 8. allowance has been implemented by the State Board of Education, the State 23 24 Department of Education shall calculate a best practices allowance for 25 each school district qualifying pursuant to section 2 of this act equal to the lesser of (1) the best practices cost certified pursuant to such 26 27 section for such school district or (2) the product of the best practices 28 cost certified pursuant to such section for such school district multiplied by the ratio of one million dollars divided by the aggregate 29 30 total of the best practices cost certified for all qualifying school districts for such school fiscal year. Fifty percent of the best 31

practices allowance calculated pursuant to this section for each qualifying school district shall be paid to such school district as best practices aid for the school fiscal year for which aid is being calculated.

7 79-1003 For purposes of the Tax Equity and Educational Opportunities8 Support Act:

9 (1) Adjusted general fund operating expenditures means (a) for school fiscal years 2013-14 through 2015-16, the difference of the 10 general fund operating expenditures as calculated pursuant to subdivision 11 (22) of this section increased by the cost growth factor calculated 12 pursuant to section 79-1007.10, minus the transportation allowance, 13 special receipts allowance, poverty allowance, limited 14 English education 15 proficiency allowance, distance and telecommunications 16 allowance, elementary site allowance, summer school allowance, 17 instructional time allowance, teacher education allowance, and focus school and program allowance, and (b) for school fiscal year 2016-17 and 18 each school fiscal year thereafter, the difference of the general fund 19 operating expenditures as calculated pursuant to subdivision (22) of this 20 section increased by the cost growth factor calculated pursuant to 21 22 section 79-1007.10, minus the transportation allowance, special receipts 23 allowance, poverty allowance, limited English proficiency allowance, 24 distance education and telecommunications allowance, elementary site allowance, summer school allowance, best practices allowance, and focus 25 school and program allowance; 26

(2) Adjusted valuation means the assessed valuation of taxable property of each local system in the state, adjusted pursuant to the adjustment factors described in section 79-1016. Adjusted valuation means the adjusted valuation for the property tax year ending during the school fiscal year immediately preceding the school fiscal year in which the aid

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1 based upon that value is to be paid. For purposes of determining the 2 local effort rate yield pursuant to section 79-1015.01, adjusted 3 valuation does not include the value of any property which a court, by a 4 final judgment from which no appeal is taken, has declared to be 5 nontaxable or exempt from taxation;

14 (5) Base fiscal year means the first school fiscal year following
15 the school fiscal year in which the reorganization or unification
16 occurred;

17 (6) Board means the school board of each school district;

(7) Categorical funds means funds limited to a specific purpose by
federal or state law, including, but not limited to, Title I funds, Title
VI funds, federal vocational education funds, federal school lunch funds,
Indian education funds, Head Start funds, and funds from the Education
Innovation Fund. Categorical funds does not include funds received
pursuant to section 79-1028.02 or 79-1028.04;

(8) Consolidate means to voluntarily reduce the number of school
districts providing education to a grade group and does not include
dissolution pursuant to section 79-498;

(9) Converted contract means an expired contract that was in effect for at least fifteen school years beginning prior to school year 2012-13 for the education of students in a nonresident district in exchange for tuition from the resident district when the expiration of such contract results in the nonresident district educating students, who would have
