"§ 14-34.8. Criminal use of laser device.		

- (a) For purposes of this section, the term "laser" means light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation. The following definitions apply in this section:
 - (1) Laser. Light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation.



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- Law enforcement agency animal. As defined in G.S. 14-163.1. 1 (2) 2 Search and rescue animal. – As defined in G.S. 14-163.1. (3) 3 It is unlawful to intentionally to point a laser device at a law enforcement officer, or (b) 4 at the head or face of another person, while the device is emitting a laser beam at any of 5 the following: 6 (1) Any of the following while the person is in the performance of his or her 7 duties: 8 A law enforcement officer. <u>a.</u> 9 A probation or parole officer. <u>b.</u> A person whose employment duties include the custody, 10 <u>c.</u> 11 transportation, or management of persons who are detained or confined to a detention facility, youth development center, or 12 13 correctional institution operated under the jurisdiction of the State or 14 a local government. A firefighter. 15 d. An emergency medical technician or other emergency health care 16 <u>e.</u> 17 provider. A member of the North Carolina National Guard. 18 <u>f.</u> A member of any branch of the Armed Forces of the United States. 19 g.  - (e) This section does not apply to laser tag, paintball guns, and other similar games and devices using light emitting diode (LED) technology."
 - **SECTION 4.** This act becomes effective December 1, 2021, and applies to offenses committed on or after that date.

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
