1 A BILL for an Act to provide an appropriation for defraying the expenses of the department of

2 public instruction, the state library, the school for the deaf, and the North Dakota vision

3 services - school for the blind; to create and enact a new section to chapter 54-24 of the North

4 Dakota Century Code, relating to the state library operating fund; to amend and reenact

5 sections 15.1-02-02, 15.1-07-33, 24-02-03.3, and 39-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code,

6 relating to the salary of the superintendent of public instruction, PowerSchool, and the

7 management and use of motor vehicles owned by the state; to provide an exemption; to provide

8 a statement of legislative intent; and to provide for legislative management studies.

9 BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY OF NORTH DAKOTA:

SECTION 1. APPROPRIATION. The funds provided in this section, or so much of the funds as may be necessary, are appropriated out of any moneys in the general fund in the state treasury, not otherwise appropriated, and from special funds derived from federal funds and other income, to the department of public instruction, the school for the deaf, North Dakota vision services - school for the blind, and the state library for the purpose of defraying the expenses of those agencies, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017, as follows:

The department of public instruction, state library, school for the deaf, and 3 North Dakota vision services - school for the blind shall report to the appropriations committees 4 of the sixty-fifth legislative assembly on the use of this one-time funding for the biennium 5 beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. 6 SECTION 3. APPROPRIATION - TUITION APPORTIONMENT. The sum of \$219,134,000, 7 included in the integrated formula payments line item in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, is 8 from the state tuition fund in the state treasury. Any additional amount in the state tuition fund 9 that becomes available for distribution to public schools is appropriated to the department of 10 public instruction for that purpose for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 11 2017. 12 SECTION 4. INTEGRATED FORMULA PAYMENTS AND SPECIAL EDUCATION 13 **CONTRACTS EXPENDITURE AUTHORITY.** The superintendent of public instruction may 14 expend funds included in the integrated formula payments and grants - special education 15 contracts line items in subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act in payment of grants for educational 16 services that were due in the 2013-15 biennium but which were not filed, claimed, or properly 17 supported by the education provider until after June 30, 2015. 18 SECTION 5. GIFTED AND TALENTED PROGRAM - MEDICAID MATCHING FUNDING -19 DISTRIBUTION. 20 The sum of \$800,000, included in the integrated formula payments line item in 1. 21 subdivision 1 of section 1 of this Act, must be distributed to reimburse school districts 22 or special education units for gifted and talented programs upon the submission of an 23 application that is approved in accordance with guidelines adopted by the 24 superintendent of public instruction. The superintendent of public instruction shall 25 encourage cooperative efforts for gifted and talented programs among school districts 26 and special education units. 27 2. State school aid payments for special education must be reduced by the amount of

 matching funds required to be paid by school districts or special education units for

27	demonstrate	quali	fying rapid enrollment growth, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and
28	ending June	30, 20	017. The superintendent of public instruction shall award grants to eligible
29	districts meet	ting th	ne following criteria:

1	1.	A district is eligible to receive a grant under this section if the number of students
2		reflected in the district's September tenth enrollment report exceeds the number of
3		students in the prior year September tenth enrollment report as follows:
4		a. For Tier 1 funding, the increase must be at least four percent or one hundred fifty
5		students and must be at least twenty students; or
6		b. For Tier 2 funding, the increase must be at least two percent or seventy-five
7		students and must be at least ten students.
8	2.	The superintendent of public instruction shall calculate the amount to which an eligible
9		district is entitled as follows:
10		a. Determine the actual percentage increase in the number of students and subtract
11		two from the percentage calculated;
12		b. Determine the number of students represented by the difference determined in
13		subdivision a of this section;
14		c. Multiply the number of students determined in subdivision b of this section by:
15		(1) \$4,000 for Tier 1 funding; or
16		(2) \$2,000 for Tier 2 funding.
17	3.	If the amount of the appropriation provided for in this Act is insufficient to meet the
18		obligations of this section, the superintendent of public instruction shall prorate the
19		payment based on the percentage of the total amount to which each school district is
20		entitled.
21	4.	The superintendent of public instruction may not expend more than \$7,400,000 in
22		grants under this section during the first year of the biennium.
23	5.	Any district that is precluded from receiving state aid under section 15.1-27-35.3 is not
24		eligible to receive a grant under this section.

26	sum of \$	150,000, or so much of the sum as may be necessary, included in the grants - other

28	grants, fo	or the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

31		application. An eligible recipient must:

2 during the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017.

3 SECTION 13. STATE AID TO PUBLIC LIBRARIES. The line item entitled grants in
4 subdivision 2 of section 1 of this Act includes \$2,133,000 for aid to public libraries, of which no
5 more than one-half is to be expended during the fiscal year ending June 30, 2016.

6 SECTION 14. OTHER GRANTS - REPORTING. The superintendent of public instruction
7 shall continue reporting on the cost per participant and the outcomes of other grants and report
8 to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly regarding participation, cost, and outcomes of these
9 grants.

10 SECTION 15. FEES DEPOSITED IN NORTH DAKOTA VISION SERVICES - SCHOOL

FOR THE BLIND OPERATING FUND. Any moneys included in the estimated income line item in subdivision 4 of section 1 of this Act, collected for subscription fees or braille fees, must be deposited in the North Dakota vision services - school for the blind operating fund in the state treasury and may be spent subject to appropriation by the legislative assembly.

SECTION 16. SCHOOL FOR THE DEAF - HIGHER EDUCATION INTERPRETER GRANT PROGRAM. The grants line item contained in subdivision 3 of section 1 of this Act is for the purpose of providing grants to assist institutions under the control of the state board of higher education with the cost of interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf or hard of hearing, for the biennium beginning July 1, 2015, and ending June 30, 2017. Moneys appropriated for this program are not subject to section 54-44.1-11. Funds shall be distributed pursuant to the provisions of this section:

- The school for the deaf shall develop a formula to determine the grant amount for
 which an institution is eligible. The formula must be based on a uniform hourly
 reimbursement.
- 25 2. To obtain a grant under this section, an institution shall submit to the school for the
 26 deaf, at the time and in the manner directed by the school, invoices showing the
 27 amount expended for interpreters and real-time captioning for students who are deaf
 28 or hard of hearing.
- 3. The school for the deaf may not distribute more than fifty percent of the amountappropriated during the first year of the biennium.

1	4.	If any grant moneys remain undistributed at the end of the biennium, the school for the
2		deaf shall provide additional prorated grants to institutions that incurred, during the
3		biennium, hourly expenses in excess of the formula reimbursement level.
4	5.	At the request of an institution under the control of the state board of higher education,
5		the school for the deaf shall consult with the institution and provide advice regarding
6		the provision of services most appropriate to meet a student's needs.
7	SEC	TION 17. AMENDMENT. Section 15.1-02-02 of the North Dakota Century Code is
8	amende	d and reenacted as follows:

20		educational technology council, each school district shall acquire PowerSchool
21		through the information technology department and use it as its principal student
22		information system.
23	2.	The superintendent of public instruction shall forward that portion of a school district's
24		state aid which is payable by the superintendent under subdivision n of subsection 1 of
25		section 15.1-27-03.1 directly to the information technology department to reimburse-
26		the department for the cost of the school district's acquisition, implementation, or
27		utilization of PowerSchool and any related technology support services. The-
28		superintendent shall forward the amount payable under this subsection at the same-
29		time and in the same manner as provided for other state aid payments under section
30		15.1-27-01.

1	3.	If the portion of a school district's state aid forwarded to the information technology-
2		department under subsection 2 exceeds the cost incurred by the information
3		technology department in providing for the school district's acquisition,
4		implementation, or utilization of PowerSchool and any related technology support
5		services, the information technology department shall return the excess moneys to the
6		superintendent of public instruction for redistribution to the school district as per-
7		student payments.
8	4.	The superintendent of public instruction may exempt a school district from having to
9		acquire and utilize PowerSchool if the school district demonstrates that, in accordance
10		with requirements of the bureau of Indian education, the district has acquired and is
11		utilizing a student information system that is determined to be comparable by the
12		superintendent.
13	SEC	TION 19. AMENDMENT. Section 24-02-03.3 of the North Dakota Century Code is
14	amende	d and reenacted as follows:
15	24-0	2-03.3. Central management system for all state-owned licensed motor vehicles.
16	1.	The director shall establish within the department a central vehicle management
17		system to regulate the operation, maintenance, and management of all motor vehicles
18		owned or leased by the state subject to registration under chapters 39-04 and 39-05.
19		Upon the request of a state agency and an agreement between the agency and
20		director for the use of the motor vehicle-related equipment, the director may purchase
21		or lease motor vehicle-related equipment and include that equipment within the
22		system. The director shall provide a uniform method of documenting the use and cost
23		of operation of motor vehicles and motor vehicle-related equipment in the system. The
24		director shall advise the director of the office of management and budget as to the
25		need to acquire or dispose of system motor vehicles. The specifications for highway
26		patrol vehicles to be acquired may be set by the highway patrol superintendent. Every

- 1 board, bureau, or commission may authorize the use of an employee's personal motor 2 vehicle pursuant to subsection 4 of section 54-06-09. 3 2. The director may enter into an agreement with a state employee who has a disability 4 requiring a specially-equipped vehicle to pay a mileage rate greater than the rate 5 established in section 54-06-09 for the employee's use of the employee's 6 specially-equipped motor vehicle while conducting state business. The rate must be 7 based on the rate provided in section 54-06-09, increased by the actual cost per mile 8 caused by the special equipment, and may not exceed the cost associated with the 9 special equipment expressed as the new value plus the depreciated fair market value
- in eight years divided by two, divided by twenty thousand miles.

 vehicle as directed by the director.
- 134.The director may enter an agreement for the use of the motor vehicle-related14equipment with the North Dakota art museum established in section 54-02-11.
- SECTION 20. AMENDMENT. Section 39-01-03 of the North Dakota Century Code is
 amended and reenacted as follows:
- 17 **39-01-03.** Motor vehicle owned by the state, <u>North Dakota art museum</u>, or an

18 international peace garden not to be used for private use or in political activities.

19 No personA person, officer, or employee of the state or of any department, board, bureau, 20 commission, institution, industry, or other agency of the state, or person, officer, or employee of 21 the North Dakota art museum, or of any entity located upon the international boundary line 22 between the United States of America and Canada used and maintained as a memorial to 23 commemorate the long-existing relationship of peace and good will between the people and the 24 governments of the United States of America and Canada and to further international peace 25 among the nations of the world, may not use or drive any motor vehicle belonging to the state or 26 to any department, board, bureau, commission, institution, industry, or other agency of the state, 27 or person, officer, or employee of the North Dakota art museum, or of any entity located upon 28 the international boundary line between the United States of America and Canada used and 29 maintained as a memorial to commemorate the long-existing relationship of peace and good will 30 between the people and the governments of the United States of America and Canada and to

- 1 further international peace among the nations of the world, for private use, or while engaged in
- 2 any political activity.

3 SECTION 21. A new section to chapter 54-24 of the North Dakota Century Code is created
4 and enacted as follows:

5 State library operating fund.

6 The state library's operating fund is a special fund in the state treasury. All moneys received

7 for book replacement, cataloging services, and other miscellaneous library services must be

8 deposited in this fund. Moneys in the fund are to be used pursuant to legislative appropriation

9 for provision of services under this chapter.

10 SECTION 22. LEGISLATIVE INTENT - REGIONAL EDUCATION ASSOCIATIONS AND

THE NORTH DAKOTA TEACHER CENTER NETWORK. It is the intent of the sixty-fourth
 legislative assembly that, during the 2015-17 biennium, the North Dakota teacher center
 network merge with regional education associations and that the mergers be complete by
 July 1, 2017.

15 SECTION 23. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - SCHOOL DISTRICT

TRANSPORTATION. During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider
 studying school district transportation and state reimbursement for transportation. The
 legislative management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any
 legislation required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

20 SECTION 24. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - TEACHER PREPARATION AND

RETENTION. During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying
 teacher preparation and retention, including reasons new teachers leave the profession, federal

23 requirements for teacher preparation programs, and possible enhancements to teacher

24 preparation programs and other programs designed to improve retention of new teachers. As

25 part of the study the superintendent of public instruction shall prepare exit interview forms to be

26 completed by school districts when a teacher separates employment. The superintendent of

- 27 public instruction shall compile the information from the exit interviews and provide a report to
- 28 the legislative management. The legislative management shall report its findings and

29 recommendations, together with any legislation required to implement the recommendations, to

30 the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.

1 SECTION 25. LEGISLATIVE MANAGEMENT STUDY - EDUCATIONAL SERVICE

2 **PROVIDERS.** During the 2015-16 interim, the legislative management shall consider studying

- 3 the effectiveness and efficiency of educational service providers, including regional education
- 4 associations, the education standards and practices board, EduTech, the center for distance
- 5 education, the North Dakota STEM network, and the teacher center network. The study shall
- 6 examine organizational, structural, administrative, and supervisory options for strengthening the
- 7 role and function of the named entities and ensuring the optimal provision of services to
- 8 students, teachers, schools, and school districts throughout the state. The legislative
- 9 management shall report its findings and recommendations, together with any legislation
- 10 required to implement the recommendations, to the sixty-fifth legislative assembly.
