

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3100

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 11, after “431.375,” insert “431.410,”.  
2 Delete lines 13 through 28 and delete pages 2 through 76 and insert:

### “FINDINGS

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6 **“SECTION 1. The Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon finds and declares that:**

7 **“(1) Each resident of this state is entitled to the basic public health services that are**  
8 **necessary to preserve life and health;**

9 **“(2) A framework for public health services provided by the government is necessary for**  
10 **applying the foundational capabilities and implementing the foundational programs by which**  
11 **the state or a local government may assess, protect or improve the health of the residents**  
12 **of this state; and**

13 **“(3) The purpose of sections 9 to 24 of this 2015 Act is to provide the framework described**  
14 **in subsection (2) of this section.**

### “DEFINITIONS

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18 **“SECTION 2. As used in sections 9 to 24 of this 2015 Act:**

19 **“(1) ‘Foundational capability’ means the knowledge, skill or ability that is necessary to**  
20 **carry out a public health activity.**

21 **“(2) ‘Foundational program’ means a public health program that is necessary to assess,**  
22 **protect or improve the health of the residents of this state.**

23 **“(3) ‘Governing body of a local public health authority’ means:**

24 **“(a) The governing body of a county;**

25 **“(b) A board described in ORS 431.414 (2);**

26 **“(c) A board established under ORS 431.414 (3); or**

27 **“(d) The board of an intergovernmental entity created by an agreement pursuant to ORS**  
28 **190.010 (5) for the purpose of providing public health services.**

29 **“(4) ‘Local health department’ means the agency established by the local public health**  
30 **authority that is responsible for administering public health programs and public health ac-**  
31 **tivities within the local public health authority’s jurisdiction.**

32 **“(5) ‘Local health officer’ means:**

33 **“(a) A local public health administrator appointed under ORS 431.418; or**

34 **“(b) If the local public health administrator appointed under ORS 431.418 is not a physi-**  
35 **cian licensed by the Oregon Medical Board, the physician who is employed by or who enters**

1 a contract with a local public health administrator under ORS 431.418.

2 “(6) ‘Local public health administrator’ means an individual appointed under ORS 431.418  
3 to supervise the public health programs and public health activities of a local health depart-  
4 ment.

5 “(7) ‘Local public health authority’ means:

6 “(a) A county government;

7 “(b) A health district formed under ORS 431.414; or

8 “(c) An intergovernmental entity that provides public health services pursuant to an  
9 agreement entered into under ORS 190.010 (5).

10  
11 “DUTIES OF THE OREGON HEALTH AUTHORITY

12  
13 “**SECTION 3.** ORS 431.110 is amended to read:

14 “431.110. [*Subject to ORS 417.300 and 417.305,*] The Oregon Health Authority shall:

15 “(1) Have direct supervision of all matters relating to the preservation of life and health of the  
16 people of [*the*] **this** state.

17 “[*(2) Keep the vital statistics and other health related statistics of the state.*]

18 “(2) **Ensure the statewide and local application of the foundational capabilities established**  
19 **under section 9 of this 2015 Act and described in sections 10, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 of this**  
20 **2015 Act.**

21 “(3) **At the state level of governance, administer the foundational programs established**  
22 **under section 17 of this 2015 Act and described in sections 18, 19, 20 and 21 of this 2015 Act.**

23 “(4) **At the local level of governance, oversee and provide support for the implementation**  
24 **of the foundational programs established under section 17 of this 2015 Act and described in**  
25 **sections 18, 19, 20 and 21 of this 2015 Act.**

26 “[*(3) (5) [Make] Conduct sanitary surveys about and investigations [and inquiries respecting]*  
27 **on** the causes and prevention of diseases[, *especially of epidemics*].

28 “[*(4) (6) Investigate, conduct hearings and issue findings in connection with annexations pro-*  
29 **posed by cities as provided in ORS 222.840 to 222.915 and 431.705 to 431.760.**

30 “[*(5) (7) Have full power in the control of all communicable diseases.*]

31 “[*(6) (8) Have the authority to send a representative of the authority to any part of the state*  
32 [*when deemed necessary*].

33 “[*(7) (9) From time to time, publish and distribute to the public [in such form as the authority*  
34 *determines, such information as in its judgment may be useful in carrying on the work or purposes for*  
35 *which the authority was established]* **information related to the functions and duties of the au-**  
36 **thority.**

37 “**SECTION 4.** (1) **For the purpose of fulfilling its duties under ORS 431.110 (2), (3) and (4),**  
38 **the Oregon Health Authority shall:**

39 “(a) **Adopt and update as necessary a statewide public health modernization assessment;**

40 “(b) **In consideration of the statewide public health modernization assessment, develop**  
41 **and modify as necessary a statewide public health modernization plan;**

42 “(c) **Implement the statewide public health modernization plan;**

43 “(d) **Subject to the provisions of ORS 431.380, develop and modify as necessary plans for**  
44 **the distribution of funds to local public health authorities;**

45 “(e) **Implement plans for the distribution of funds to local public health authorities;**

1 “(f) Coordinate state and local administration of the foundational programs established  
2 under section 17 of this 2015 Act;

3 “(g) Approve local plans for applying the foundational capabilities established under sec-  
4 tion 9 of this 2015 Act and implementing the foundational programs established under section  
5 17 of this 2015 Act as required by ORS 431.385;

6 “(h) Monitor the progress of local public health authorities in meeting statewide public  
7 health goals, including applying the foundational capabilities established under section 9 of  
8 this 2015 Act and implementing the foundational programs established under section 17 of  
9 this 2015 Act;

10 “(i) For the purpose of making distributions under ORS 431.380, consult with and consider  
11 the recommendations of local public health authorities on the total cost to local public health  
12 authorities of applying the foundational capabilities established under section 9 of this 2015  
13 Act and implementing the foundational programs established under section 17 of this 2015  
14 as identified by local public health authorities in community modernization assessments  
15 adopted under ORS 431.416;

16 “(j) Use incentives adopted under ORS 431.380 to encourage the effective and equitable  
17 provision of public health services by local public health authorities;

18 “(k) Seek funding, including in the form of federal grants, for sections 9 to 24 of this 2015  
19 Act; and

20 “(L) Coordinate and collaborate with federal agencies in implementing sections 9 to 24  
21 of this 2015 Act.

22 “(2) The Oregon Health Authority shall solicit input from the Conference of Local Health  
23 Officials and local public health authorities in:

24 “(a) Establishing the foundational capabilities under section 9 of this 2015 Act and the  
25 foundational programs under section 17 of this 2015 Act;

26 “(b) Adopting and updating a statewide public health modernization assessment under  
27 subsection (1)(a) of this section;

28 “(c) Developing and modifying a statewide public health modernization plan under sub-  
29 section (1)(b) of this section; and

30 “(d) Developing and modifying plans for the distribution of funds under subsection (1)(d)  
31 of this section.

32  
33 **“OREGON PUBLIC HEALTH ADVISORY BOARD**

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35 **“SECTION 5.** ORS 431.195 is amended to read:

36 “431.195. [(1) *There is established the Oregon Public Health Advisory Board to serve as an advi-*  
37 *sory body to the Oregon Health Authority.*]

38 “[*(2) The members of the board shall be residents of this state and shall be appointed by the*  
39 *Governor. The board shall consist of 15 members at least one-half of whom shall be public members*  
40 *broadly representing the state as a whole and the others to include representatives of local government*  
41 *and public and private health providers.*]

42 “[*(3) The board shall:*]

43 “[*(a) Advise the authority on policy matters related to public health programs.*]

44 “[*(b) Provide a review of statewide public health issues and make recommendations to the author-*  
45 *ity.*]

1        “(c) Participate in public health policy development.]  
2        “[(4) Members shall be appointed for four-year terms. No person shall serve more than two con-  
3        secutive terms.]  
4        “[(5) The board shall meet at least quarterly.]  
5        “[(6) Members of the board shall be entitled to compensation and expenses as provided in ORS  
6        292.495.]  
7        “[(7) Vacancies on the board shall be filled by appointments of the Governor for the unexpired  
8        term.]  
9        **“(1)(a) The Oregon Public Health Advisory Board is established for the purpose of advis-  
10       ing and making recommendations to the Oregon Health Authority and the Oregon Health  
11       Policy Board. The Oregon Public Health Advisory Board shall consist of:**  
12        **“(A) Thirteen members appointed by the Governor as specified in paragraph (b) of this  
13       subsection;**  
14        **“(B) The Public Health Director or the Public Health Director’s designee;**  
15        **“(C) If the Public Health Director is not the State Health Officer, the State Health Offi-  
16       cer or a physician licensed under ORS chapter 677 acting as the State Health Officer’s  
17       designee;**  
18        **“(D) If the Public Health Director is the State Health Officer, a representative from the  
19       Oregon Health Authority who is familiar with public health programs and public health ac-  
20       tivities in this state; and**  
21        **“(E) A designee of the Oregon Health Policy Board.**  
22        **“(b) The Governor shall appoint the following individuals to the board:**  
23        **“(A) A state employee who has technical expertise in the field of public health;**  
24        **“(B) A local public health administrator who supervises public health programs and  
25       public health activities in Benton, Clackamas, Deschutes, Jackson, Lane, Marion, Multnomah  
26       or Washington County;**  
27        **“(C) A local public health administrator who supervises public health programs and pub-  
28       lic health activities in Coos, Douglas, Josephine, Klamath, Linn, Polk, Umatilla or Yamhill  
29       County;**  
30        **“(D) A local public health administrator who supervises public health programs and  
31       public health activities in Clatsop, Columbia, Crook, Curry, Hood River, Jefferson, Lincoln,  
32       Tillamook, Union or Wasco County;**  
33        **“(E) A local public health administrator who supervises public health programs and  
34       public health activities in Baker, Gilliam, Grant, Harney, Lake, Malheur, Morrow, Sherman,  
35       Wallowa or Wheeler County;**  
36        **“(F) A local health officer who is not a local public health administrator;**  
37        **“(G) An individual who represents the Conference of Local Health Officials created under  
38       ORS 431.330;**  
39        **“(H) An individual who represents coordinated care organizations;**  
40        **“(I) An individual who represents health care organizations that are not coordinated care  
41       organizations;**  
42        **“(J) An individual who represents individuals who provide public health services directly  
43       to the public;**  
44        **“(K) An expert in the field of public health who has a background in academia;**  
45        **“(L) An expert in population health metrics; and**

1           “(M) An at-large member.

2           “(2)(a) The term of office for a board member appointed under this section is four years,  
3 but a member serves at the pleasure of the Governor. Before the expiration of the term of  
4 a member, the Governor shall appoint a successor whose term begins on January 1 next  
5 following. A member is eligible for reappointment. If there is a vacancy for any cause, the  
6 Governor shall make an appointment to become immediately effective for the unexpired  
7 term.

8           “(b) Members of the board described in subsection (1)(a)(B) to (E) of this section are  
9 nonvoting ex officio members of the board.

10          “(3) A majority of the voting members of the board constitutes a quorum for the trans-  
11 action of business.

12          “(4) Official action by the board requires the approval of a majority of the voting mem-  
13 bers of the board.

14          “(5) The board shall elect one of its voting members to serve as chairperson.

15          “(6) The board shall meet at times and places specified by the call of the chairperson or  
16 of a majority of the voting members of the board.

17          “(7) The board may adopt rules necessary for the operation of the board.

18          “(8) The board may establish committees and subcommittees necessary for the operation  
19 of the board.

20          “(9) Voting members of the board are entitled to compensation and expenses as provided  
21 in ORS 292.495.

22          “**SECTION 6.** The term of membership for a person who is a member of the Oregon  
23 Public Health Advisory Board immediately before the operative date specified in section 114  
24 of this 2015 Act expires on the operative date specified in section 114 of this 2015 Act. A  
25 member whose term expires under this section is eligible for reappointment. Of the members  
26 first appointed to the board on or after the operative date specified in section 114 of this 2015  
27 Act:

28          “(1) Four shall serve for terms ending January 1, 2017.

29          “(2) Three shall serve for terms ending January 1, 2018.

30          “(3) Three shall serve for terms ending January 1, 2019.

31          “(4) Three shall serve for terms ending January 1, 2020.

32          “**SECTION 7.** The Oregon Public Health Advisory Board shall:

33          “(1) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on the development of  
34 statewide public health policies and goals;

35          “(2) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on how other statewide  
36 priorities, such as the provision of early learning services and the delivery of health care  
37 services, affect and are affected by statewide public health policies and goals;

38          “(3) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on the establishment of  
39 the foundational capabilities under section 9 of this 2015 Act, the foundational programs un-  
40 der section 17 of this 2015 Act and any other public health program or activity under section  
41 22 of this 2015 Act;

42          “(4) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on the adoption and up-  
43 dating of the statewide public health modernization assessment under section 4 of this 2015  
44 Act;

45          “(5) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on the development of

1 and any modification to the statewide public health modernization plan developed under  
2 section 4 of this 2015 Act;

3 “(6) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Authority and the Oregon Health Pol-  
4 icy Board on:

5 “(a) The development of and any modification to plans developed under section 4 of this  
6 2015 Act for the distribution of funds to local public health authorities; and

7 “(b) The total cost to local public health authorities of applying the foundational capa-  
8 bilities established under section 9 of this 2015 Act and implementing the foundational pro-  
9 grams established under section 17 of this 2015 Act;

10 “(7) Make recommendations to the Oregon Health Policy Board on the use of incentives  
11 by the Oregon Health Authority under ORS 431.380 to encourage the effective and equitable  
12 provision of public health services by local public health authorities;

13 “(8) Provide support to local public health authorities in developing local plans to apply  
14 the foundational capabilities established under section 9 of this 2015 Act and implement the  
15 foundational programs established under section 17 of this 2015 Act as required by ORS  
16 431.385;

17 “(9) Monitor the progress of local public health authorities in meeting statewide public  
18 health goals, including employing the foundational capabilities established under section 9 of  
19 this 2015 Act and implementing the foundational programs established under section 17 of  
20 this 2015 Act;

21 “(10) Assist the Oregon Health Authority in seeking funding, including in the form of  
22 federal grants, for sections 9 to 24 of this 2015 Act; and

23 “(11) Assist the Oregon Health Authority in coordinating and collaborating with federal  
24 agencies.

25  
26 “OREGON HEALTH POLICY BOARD

27  
28 “SECTION 8. In addition to the duties described in ORS 413.011, the Oregon Health Policy  
29 Board shall:

30 “(1) Be the policy-making and oversight body for the Oregon Health Authority with re-  
31 spect to the application of the foundational capabilities established under section 9 of this  
32 2015 Act and the implementation of the foundational programs established under section 17  
33 of this 2015 Act; and

34 “(2) Provide advice to the Oregon Health Authority based on the recommendations made  
35 by the Oregon Public Health Advisory Board under section 7 of this 2015 Act.

36  
37 “FOUNDATIONAL CAPABILITIES AND PROGRAMS

38  
39 “SECTION 9. (1) The Oregon Health Authority, in consideration of the advice provided  
40 by the Oregon Health Policy Board under section 8 of this 2015 Act, shall establish by rule  
41 the foundational capabilities necessary to protect and improve the health of the residents  
42 of this state and to achieve effective and equitable health outcomes for the residents of this  
43 state.

44 “(2) At a minimum, the authority shall establish the following foundational capabilities:

45 “(a) Assessment and epidemiology, as described in section 10 of this 2015 Act;

1       “(b) Emergency preparedness and response, as described in section 11 of this 2015 Act;  
2       “(c) Communications as described in section 12 of this 2015 Act;  
3       “(d) Policy and planning as described in section 13 of this 2015 Act;  
4       “(e) Leadership and organizational competencies, as described in section 14 of this 2015  
5 Act;  
6       “(f) Health equity and cultural responsiveness, as described in section 15 of this 2015 Act;  
7 and  
8       “(g) Community partnership development, as described in section 16 of this 2015 Act.  
9       “**SECTION 10.** (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
10 section 9 of this 2015 Act, assessment and epidemiology include, but are not limited to, the  
11 knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to:  
12       “(a) Identify and respond to disease outbreaks and epidemics;  
13       “(b) Analyze and respond to information related to disease outbreaks and epidemics;  
14       “(c) Conduct and assess surveys about health behaviors and practices;  
15       “(d) Collect and maintain vital records and statistics;  
16       “(e) Process data from a variety of sources, including vital records, health records, hos-  
17 pital data, insurance data and indicators of community or environmental health;  
18       “(f) Analyze key indicators of a community’s health;  
19       “(g) Analyze data related to the causes and burdens of disease, injury, disability and  
20 death;  
21       “(h) Prioritize and respond to requests for data processed and analyzed as described in  
22 this section and communicate the response in a manner that is accurate, statistically valid  
23 and usable by the requester;  
24       “(i) Identify how disease, injury, disability and death disproportionately affect certain  
25 populations, including populations specific to sex, race, ethnicity and socioeconomic status;  
26       “(j) Conduct a public health modernization assessment and identify priorities arising from  
27 that assessment, as required by ORS 431.416 or section 4 of this 2015 Act; and  
28       “(k) Use relevant data to implement, monitor, evaluate and modify state health im-  
29 provement plans or community health improvement plans.  
30       “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
31 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
32 and that are necessary for local governance.  
33       “**SECTION 11.** (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
34 section 9 of this 2015 Act, emergency preparedness and response include, but are not limited  
35 to, the knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to:  
36       “(a) Develop, exercise, improve and maintain preparedness and response plans in the  
37 event that either a natural or man-made disaster or an emergency occurs;  
38       “(b) Communicate and coordinate with health care providers, emergency service provid-  
39 ers and other agencies and organizations that respond to disasters and emergencies;  
40       “(c) Activate emergency response personnel during a disaster or emergency, and recog-  
41 nize if public health has a primary, secondary or ancillary role in response activities;  
42       “(d) Use communications systems effectively and efficiently during a disaster or emer-  
43 gency;  
44       “(e) Maintain and execute a plan providing for continuity of operations during a disaster  
45 or emergency, including a plan for accessing resources necessary to recover from or respond

1 to a disaster or emergency;

2 “(f) Issue and enforce emergency health orders;

3 “(g) Be notified of and respond to potential disasters and emergencies; and

4 “(h) Address the needs of vulnerable populations during a disaster or emergency.

5 “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
6 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
7 and that are necessary for local governance.

8 “SECTION 12. (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
9 section 9 of this 2015 Act, communications include, but are not limited to, the knowledge,  
10 skills and abilities necessary to:

11 “(a) Engage in two-way communications with the public through the use of a variety of  
12 accessible methods of communication;

13 “(b) Effectively use mass media and social media to transmit communications to and  
14 receive communications from the public;

15 “(c) Communicate with specific populations in a manner that is culturally and linguis-  
16 tically appropriate;

17 “(d) Develop and implement educational programs and preventive strategies; and

18 “(e) During a disease outbreak or other disaster or emergency, provide accurate, timely  
19 and understandable information, recommendations and instructions to the public.

20 “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
21 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
22 and that are necessary for local governance.

23 “SECTION 13. (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
24 section 9 of this 2015 Act, policy and planning include, but are not limited to, the knowledge,  
25 skills and abilities necessary to:

26 “(a) Enable the Oregon Health Authority and local public health authorities to serve as  
27 a primary and expert resource for using science and evidence-based best practices to inform  
28 the development and implementation of public health policies;

29 “(b) Provide guidance and coordinate planning for the purpose of developing, adopting and  
30 implementing public health policies;

31 “(c) Develop public health policy options necessary to protect and improve the health of  
32 the public and specific adversely impacted populations;

33 “(d) Understand and use the principles of public health law to improve and protect the  
34 health of the public;

35 “(e) Analyze and disseminate findings on the intended and unintended impacts of public  
36 health policies; and

37 “(f) Implement, monitor, evaluate and modify state health improvement plans or com-  
38 munity health improvement plans.

39 “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
40 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
41 and that are necessary for local governance.

42 “SECTION 14. (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
43 section 9 of this 2015 Act, leadership and organizational competencies include, but are not  
44 limited to, the knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to:

45 “(a) Define the strategic direction necessary to achieve public health goals and align and



1 lead stakeholders in achieving those goals;

2 “(b) Use the principles of public health law, including relevant agency rules and the  
3 constitutional guarantee of due process, in planning, implementing and enforcing public  
4 health initiatives;

5 “(c) Promote and monitor organizational objectives while sustaining a culture of quality  
6 of service;

7 “(d) Maintain a competent workforce necessary to ensure the effective and equitable  
8 provision of public health services;

9 “(e) Provide continuing education and other training opportunities necessary to maintain  
10 a competent workforce;

11 “(f) Develop partnerships with institutions of higher education necessary to maintain a  
12 competent workforce;

13 “(g) To the extent practicable, ensure that local public health administrators, local health  
14 officers and individuals who work in the field of public health reflect the demographics of the  
15 community being served and the changing demographics of this state;

16 “(h) Implement and maintain the technology needed to support public health operations  
17 while simultaneously protecting personally identifiable information and other confidential  
18 health information; and

19 “(i) Use accounting and business best practices in budgeting, tracking finances, billing,  
20 auditing, securing grants and other sources of funding and distributing moneys to govern-  
21 mental and nongovernmental partners.

22 “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
23 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
24 and that are necessary for local governance.

25 “SECTION 15. (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
26 section 9 of this 2015 Act, health equity and cultural responsiveness include, but are not  
27 limited to, the knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to:

28 “(a) Support public health policies that promote health equity;

29 “(b) Implement processes within public health programs that create health equity;

30 “(c) Recognize and address health inequities that are specific to certain populations, in-  
31 cluding populations specific to sex, race, ethnicity and socioeconomic status;

32 “(d) Communicate with the public and stakeholders in a transparent and inclusive man-  
33 ner;

34 “(e) When appropriate, provide the public and stakeholders with access to the data and  
35 findings described in section 10 of this 2015 Act; and

36 “(f) Engage diverse populations in community health planning.

37 “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
38 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
39 and that are necessary for local governance.

40 “SECTION 16. (1) For the purpose of establishing the foundational capabilities under  
41 section 9 of this 2015 Act, community partnership development includes, but is not limited  
42 to, the knowledge, skills and abilities necessary to:

43 “(a) Convene and sustain relationships with traditional and nontraditional governmental  
44 partners and stakeholders and traditional and nontraditional nongovernmental partners and  
45 stakeholders;

1       “(b) Foster and support community involvement and partnerships in developing, adopting  
2 and implementing public health policies;

3       “(c) Engage members of the community in implementing, monitoring, evaluating and  
4 modifying state health improvement plans or community health improvement plans; and

5       “(d) Develop, strengthen and expand connections across disciplines, such as education  
6 and health care, and with members of the community who work in those disciplines.

7       “(2) For purposes of this section, the Oregon Health Authority may adopt rules differ-  
8 entiating between the knowledge, skills and abilities that are necessary for state governance  
9 and that are necessary for local governance.

10       “SECTION 17. (1) The Oregon Health Authority, in consideration of any advice provided  
11 by the Oregon Health Policy Board under section 8 of this 2015 Act, shall establish by rule  
12 the foundational programs through which the authority and local public health authorities  
13 administer public health services in this state.

14       “(2) At a minimum, the authority shall establish the following foundational programs:

26 provide health care or maintain written accounts of health care provided to individuals; or

27 “(B) Units, programs or services designated, operated or maintained by a public provider to  
28 provide health care or maintain written accounts of health care provided to individuals.

29 “(c) ‘Individually identifiable health information’ means any health information that is:

30 “(A) Created or received by a health care services provider; and

31 “(B) Identifiable to an individual, including demographic information that identifies the individ-  
32 ual, or for which there is a reasonable basis to believe the information can be used to identify an  
33 individual, and that relates to:

34 “(i) The past, present or future physical or mental health or condition of an individual;

35 “(ii) The provision of health care to an individual; or

36 “(iii) The past, present or future payment for the provision of health care to an individual.

37 “(d) ‘Personal representative’ includes but is not limited to:

38 “(A) A person appointed as a guardian under ORS 125.305, 419B.372, 419C.481 or 419C.555 with  
39 authority to make medical and health care decisions;

40 “(B) A person appointed as a health care representative under ORS 127.505 to 127.660 or a  
41 representative under ORS 127.700 to 127.737 to make health care decisions or mental health treat-  
42 ment decisions; and

43 “(C) A person appointed as a personal representative under ORS chapter 113.

44 “(e) ‘Psychotherapy notes’ means notes recorded in any medium:

45 “(A) By a mental health professional, in the performance of the official duties of the mental

1 health professional;

2 “(B) Documenting or analyzing the contents of conversation during a counseling session; and

3 “(C) That are maintained separately from the rest of the individual’s record.

4 “(f) ‘Psychotherapy notes’ does not mean notes documenting:

5 “(A) Medication prescription and monitoring;

6 “(B) Counseling session start and stop times;

7 “(C) Modalities and frequencies of treatment furnished;

8 “(D) Results of clinical tests; or

9 “(E) Any summary of the following items:

10 “(i) Diagnosis;

11 “(ii) Functional status;

12 “(iii) Treatment plan;

13 “(iv) Symptoms;

14 “(v) Prognosis; or

15 “(vi) Progress to date.

16 “(g) ‘Public provider’ means:

17 “(A) The Blue Mountain Recovery Center and the Oregon State Hospital campuses;

18 “(B) Department of Corrections institutions as defined in ORS 421.005;

19 “(C) A contractor of the Department of Corrections or the Oregon Health Authority that pro-

20 vides health care to individuals residing in a state institution operated by the agencies;

21 “(D) A community mental health program or community developmental disabilities program as

22 described in ORS 430.610 to 430.695 and the public and private entities with which it contracts to

23 provide mental health or developmental disabilities programs or services;

24 “(E) A program or service provided under ORS 431.250[, 431.375 to 431.385] or 431.416 **or**

25 **sections 9 to 24 of this 2015 Act;**

26 “(F) A program or service established or maintained under ORS 430.630 or 430.664;

27 “(G) A program or facility providing an organized full-day or part-day program of treatment that

28 is licensed, approved, established, maintained or operated by or contracted with the Oregon Health

29 Authority for alcoholism, drug addiction or mental or emotional disturbance;

30 “(H) A program or service providing treatment by appointment that is licensed, approved, es-

31 tablished, maintained or operated by or contracted with the authority for alcoholism, drug addiction

32 or mental or emotional disturbance; or

33 “(I) The impaired health professional program established under ORS 676.190.

34 “(h) ‘Written account’ means records containing only individually identifiable health information.

35 “(2) Except as provided in subsections (3), (4), (6), (7), (8), (9), (11), (12), (14), (15), (16) and (17)

36 of this section or unless otherwise permitted or required by state or federal law or by order of the

37 court, written accounts of the individuals served by any health care services provider maintained

38 in or by the health care services provider by the officers or employees thereof who are authorized

39 to maintain written accounts within the official scope of their duties are not subject to access and

40 may not be disclosed. This subsection applies to written accounts maintained in or by facilities of

41 the Department of Corrections only to the extent that the written accounts concern the medical,

42 dental or psychiatric treatment as patients of those under the jurisdiction of the Department of

43 Corrections.

44 “(3) If the individual or a personal representative of the individual provides an authorization,

45 the content of any written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section must be disclosed

1 accordingly, if the authorization is in writing and is signed and dated by the individual or the per-  
2 sonal representative of the individual and sets forth with specificity the following:

3 “(a) Name of the health care services provider authorized to make the disclosure, except when  
4 the authorization is provided by recipients of or applicants for public assistance or medical assist-  
5 ance, as defined in ORS 414.025, to a governmental entity for purposes of determining eligibility for  
6 benefits or investigating for fraud;

7 “(b) Name or title of the persons or organizations to which the information is to be disclosed  
8 or that information may be disclosed to the public;

9 “(c) Name of the individual;

10 “(d) Extent or nature of the information to be disclosed; and

11 “(e) Statement that the authorization is subject to revocation at any time except to the extent  
12 that action has been taken in reliance thereon, and a specification of the date, event or condition  
13 upon which it expires without express revocation. However, a revocation of an authorization is not  
14 valid with respect to inspection or records necessary to validate expenditures by or on behalf of  
15 governmental entities.

16 “(4) The content of any written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section may be  
17 disclosed without an authorization:

18 “(a) To any person to the extent necessary to meet a medical emergency.

19 “(b) At the discretion of the responsible officer of the health care services provider, which in  
20 the case of any Oregon Health Authority facility or community mental health program is the Di-  
21 rector of the Oregon Health Authority, to persons engaged in scientific research, program evalu-  
22 ation, peer review and fiscal audits. However, individual identities may not be disclosed to such  
23 persons, except when the disclosure is essential to the research, evaluation, review or audit and is  
24 consistent with state and federal law.

25 “(c) To governmental agencies when necessary to secure compensation for services rendered in  
26 the treatment of the individual.

27 “(5) When an individual’s identity is disclosed under subsection (4) of this section, a health care  
28 services provider shall prepare, and include in the permanent records of the health care services  
29 provider, a written statement indicating the reasons for the disclosure, the written accounts dis-  
30 closed and the recipients of the disclosure.

31 “(6) The content of any written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section and held by  
32 a health care services provider currently engaged in the treatment of an individual may be disclosed  
33 to officers or employees of that provider, its agents or cooperating health care services providers  
34 who are currently acting within the official scope of their duties to evaluate treatment programs,  
35 to diagnose or treat or to assist in diagnosing or treating an individual when the written account  
36 is to be used in the course of diagnosing or treating the individual. Nothing in this subsection  
37 prevents the transfer of written accounts referred to in subsection (2) of this section among health  
38 care services providers, the Department of Corrections, the Oregon Health Authority or a local  
39 correctional facility when the transfer is necessary or beneficial to the treatment of an individual.

40 “(7) When an action, suit, claim, arbitration or proceeding is brought under ORS 34.105 to 34.240  
41 or 34.310 to 34.730 and involves a claim of constitutionally inadequate medical care, diagnosis or  
42 treatment, or is brought under ORS 30.260 to 30.300 and involves the Department of Corrections or  
43 an institution operated by the department, nothing in this section prohibits the disclosure of any  
44 written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section to the Department of Justice, Oregon  
45 Department of Administrative Services, or their agents, upon request, or the subsequent disclosure

1 to a court, administrative hearings officer, arbitrator or other administrative decision maker.

2 “(8)(a) When an action, suit, claim, arbitration or proceeding involves the Oregon Health Au-  
3 thority or an institution operated by the authority, nothing in this section prohibits the disclosure  
4 of any written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section to the Department of Justice,  
5 Oregon Department of Administrative Services, or their agents.

6 “(b) Disclosure of information in an action, suit, claim, nonlabor arbitration or proceeding is  
7 limited by the relevancy restrictions of ORS 40.010 to 40.585, 183.710 to 183.725, 183.745 and 183.750  
8 and ORS chapter 183. Only written accounts of a plaintiff, claimant or petitioner shall be disclosed  
9 under this paragraph.

10 “(c) Disclosure of information as part of a labor arbitration or proceeding to support a personnel  
11 action taken against staff is limited to written accounts directly relating to alleged action or in-  
12 action by staff for which the personnel action was imposed.

13 “(9)(a) The copy of any written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section, upon written  
14 request of the individual or a personal representative of the individual, shall be disclosed to the  
15 individual or the personal representative of the individual within a reasonable time not to exceed  
16 five working days. The individual or the personal representative of the individual shall have the  
17 right to timely access to any written accounts.

18 “(b) If the disclosure of psychiatric or psychological information contained in the written ac-  
19 count would constitute an immediate and grave detriment to the treatment of the individual, dis-  
20 closure may be denied, if medically contraindicated by the treating physician or a licensed health  
21 care professional in the written account of the individual.

22 “(c) The Department of Corrections may withhold psychiatric or psychological information if:

23 “(A) The information relates to an individual other than the individual seeking it.

24 “(B) Disclosure of the information would constitute a danger to another individual.

25 “(C) Disclosure of the information would compromise the privacy of a confidential source.

26 “(d) However, a written statement of the denial under paragraph (c) of this subsection and the

33 “(11) A written account referred to in subsection (2) of this section may not be used to initiate  
34 or substantiate any criminal, civil, administrative, legislative or other proceedings conducted by  
35 federal, state or local authorities against the individual or to conduct any investigations of the in-  
36 dividual. If the individual, as a party to an action, suit or other judicial proceeding, voluntarily  
37 produces evidence regarding an issue to which a written account referred to in subsection (2) of this  
38 section would be relevant, the contents of that written account may be disclosed for use in the  
39 proceeding.

40 “(12) Information obtained in the course of diagnosis, evaluation or treatment of an individual  
41 that, in the professional judgment of the health care services provider, indicates a clear and imme-  
42 diate danger to others or to society may be reported to the appropriate authority. A decision not  
43 to disclose information under this subsection does not subject the provider to any civil liability.  
44 Nothing in this subsection may be construed to alter the provisions of ORS 146.750, 146.760,  
45 419B.010, 419B.015, 419B.020, 419B.025, 419B.030, 419B.035, 419B.040 and 419B.045.

1 “(13) The prohibitions of this section apply to written accounts concerning any individual who  
2 has been treated by any health care services provider irrespective of whether or when the individual  
3 ceases to receive treatment.

4 “(14) Persons other than the individual or the personal representative of the individual who are  
5 granted access under this section to the contents of a written account referred to in subsection (2)  
6 of this section may not disclose the contents of the written account to any other person except in  
7 accordance with the provisions of this section.

8 “(15) Nothing in this section prevents the Department of Human Services or the Oregon Health  
9 Authority from disclosing the contents of written accounts in its possession to individuals or agen-  
10 cies with whom children in its custody are placed.

11 “(16) The system described in ORS 192.517 (1) shall have access to records, as defined in ORS  
12 192.515, as provided in ORS 192.517.

13 “(17)(a) Except as provided in paragraph (b) of this subsection, a health care services provider  
14 must obtain an authorization from an individual or a personal representative of the individual to  
15 disclose psychotherapy notes.

16 “(b) A health care services provider may use or disclose psychotherapy notes without obtaining  
17 an authorization from the individual or a personal representative of the individual to carry out the  
18 following treatment, payment and health care operations:

19 “(A) Use by the originator of the psychotherapy notes for treatment;

20 “(B) Disclosure by the health care services provider for its own training program in which stu-  
21 dents, trainees or practitioners in mental health learn under supervision to practice or improve their  
22 skills in group, joint, family or individual counseling; or

23 “(C) Disclosure by the health care services provider to defend itself in a legal action or other  
24 proceeding brought by the individual or a personal representative of the individual.

25 “(c) An authorization for the disclosure of psychotherapy notes may not be combined with an  
26 authorization for a disclosure of any other individually identifiable health information, but may be  
27 combined with another authorization for a disclosure of psychotherapy notes.

29 “222.850. As used in ORS 222.840 to 222.915, unless the context requires otherwise:

30 “(1) ‘Affected territory’ means an area within the urban growth boundary of a city and which  
31 is otherwise eligible for annexation to that city and in which there exists an actual or alleged dan-  
32 ger to public health.

33 “(2) ‘Authority’ means the Oregon Health Authority.

34 “(3) ‘City council’ means the legislative body of a city.

3 “(k) The entity meets any other qualifications established by the Early Learning Council.

4 “(5) The Early Learning Council may adopt by rule requirements that are in addition to the  
5 requirements described in subsections (3) and (4) of this section that an entity must meet to qualify  
6 as an Early Learning Hub. When developing the additional requirements, the council must use a  
7 statewide public process of community engagement that is consistent with the requirements of the  
8 federal Head Start Act.

9 “(6) When determining whether to designate an entity as an Early Learning Hub, the Early  
10 Learning Council shall balance the following factors:

11 “(a) The entity’s ability to engage the community and be involved in the community.

12 “(b) The entity’s ability to produce outcomes that benefit children.

13 “(c) The entity’s resourcefulness.

14 “(d) The entity’s use, or proposed use, of evidence-based practices.

15 “(7) The Early Learning Council may alter the lines of the territory served by an Early Learning  
16 Hub only to ensure that all children of this state are served by an Early Learning Hub.

17 “(8) An entity designated as part of an Early Learning Hub may not use more than 15 percent  
18 of the moneys received by the entity from the Early Learning Council to pay administrative costs  
19 of the entity.

20 “(9) The Department of Human Services or the Oregon Health Authority may not transfer any  
21 authority for determining eligibility for a state or federal program to an Early Learning Hub.

23 “418.325. (1) A child-caring agency shall safeguard the health of each ward or other dependent  
24 or delinquent child in its care by providing for medical examinations of each child by a qualified

8 to inspection for evidence of child abuse in accordance with rules of the Department of Human  
9 Services, and be tested for visual and aural acuity consistent with the child’s age.  
10 “(6) A child-caring agency shall record the results of tests provided a child pursuant to sub-  
11 sections (1) to (5) of this section in the child’s health record. The child’s health record shall be kept  
12 as a part of the agency’s total records of that child. The child’s health record shall be made avail-  
13 able to both natural parents and to both prospective foster or adoptive parents of that child. A  
14 qualified member of a child-caring agency under the supervision of a qualified physician shall ex-  
15 plain to adoptive parents the medical factors possible as a result of a child’s birth history, heredi-  
16 tary or congenital defects, or disease or disability experience.  
17 “(7) This section does not apply to a private residential boarding school as defined in ORS  
18 418.205 (5)(a).  
19 “**SECTION 63.** ORS 418.747 is amended to read:  
20 “418.747. (1) The district attorney in each county shall be responsible for developing county  
21 multidisciplinary child abuse teams to consist of but not be limited to law enforcement personnel,  
22 Department of Human Services child protective service workers, school officials, [county] local  
23 health department personnel, county mental health department personnel who have experience with  
24 children and family mental health issues, child abuse intervention center workers, if available, and  
25 juvenile department representatives, as well as others specially trained in child abuse, child sexual  
26 abuse and rape of children investigation.  
27 “(2) The teams shall develop a written protocol for immediate investigation of and notification  
28 procedures for child abuse cases and for interviewing child abuse victims. Each team also shall de-

39 “(3) Each team member and the personnel conducting child abuse investigations and interviews  
40 of child abuse victims shall be trained in risk assessment, dynamics of child abuse, child sexual  
41 abuse and rape of children and legally sound and age appropriate interview and investigatory tech-  
42 niques.  
43 “(4) All investigations of child abuse and interviews of child abuse victims shall be carried out  
44 by appropriate personnel using the protocols and procedures called for in this section. If trained  
45 personnel are not available in a timely fashion and, in the judgment of a law enforcement officer

1 or child protective services worker, there is reasonable cause to believe a delay in investigation or  
2 interview of the child abuse victim could place the child in jeopardy of physical harm, the investi-

24 “(2)(a) The Central Oregon Health Council shall conduct a regional health assessment and adopt  
25 a regional health improvement plan to serve as a strategic population health and health care system  
26 service plan for the region served by the council. The plan must define the scope of the activities,  
27 services and responsibilities that the council proposes to assume upon implementation of the plan.  
28 “(b) The activities, services and responsibilities that the council proposes to assume under the  
29 plan may include, but are not limited to:  
30 “(A) Analysis and development of public and private resources, capacities and metrics based on  
31 ongoing regional health assessment activities and population health priorities;  
32 “(B) Health policy;  
33 “(C) System design;  
34 “(D) Outcome and quality improvement;  
35 “(E) Integration of service delivery; and  
36 “(F) Workforce development.  
37 “(3) The council shall submit the plan adopted under subsection (2) of this section to the au-  
38 thority for approval. The authority may approve the plan or return it to the council for modification  
39 prior to approval.  
40 “(4) The regional health improvement plan adopted under this section shall serve as a guide for  
41 entities serving medical assistance recipients, public health authorities, mental health authorities,  
42 health care systems, payer groups, provider groups and health coalitions in the counties served by  
43 the council.

14 "SECTION 117. This 2015 Act being necessary for the immediate preservation of the  
15 public peace, health and safety, an emergency is declared to exist, and this 2015 Act takes  
16 effect on its passage."  
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
