

## HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE BILL 3499

1 On page 1 of the printed bill, line 2, after “ORS” insert “327.008,”.

2 In line 3, after “329.157,” insert “329.488,”.

3 Delete lines 5 through 28 and delete pages 2 through 9 and insert:

4 **“SECTION 1. (1) The Department of Education shall convene an advisory group to de-**  
5 **velop uniform budget coding requirements and uniform reporting requirements to provide**  
6 **budget transparency for the spending of moneys received by school districts as provided by**  
7 **ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) for students in average daily membership eligible for and enrolled in**  
8 **an English language learner program under ORS 336.079.**

9 **“(2) Taking into consideration the work of the advisory group under this section, the**  
10 **State Board of Education shall adopt rules related to uniform budget coding requirements**  
11 **no later than January 1, 2016.**

12 **“SECTION 2. Section 1 of this 2015 Act is repealed on January 2, 2016.**

13 **“SECTION 3. (1) The Department of Education shall convene a work group related to**  
14 **English language learner programs.**

15 **“(2) The work group must consist of educators, parents, community stakeholders, ex-**  
16 **perts on English language learner policy and experts in collecting and analyzing data. The**  
17 **department shall solicit recommendations for membership from organizations that represent**  
18 **educators, administrators, school district boards and parents when determining membership**  
19 **of the work group.**

20 **“(3) The work group shall identify the following:**

21 **“(a) Criteria for determining if a school district is:**

22 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an**  
23 **English language learner program, taking into account the specific learning challenges and**  
24 **demographics of the students; or**

25 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

26 **“(b) Information necessary for school districts to include in an annual report on student**  
27 **progress indicators for students eligible for and enrolled in an English language learner**  
28 **program for the purpose of determining if a school district is:**

29 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an**  
30 **English language learner program, taking into account the specific learning challenges and**  
31 **demographics of the students; or**

32 **“(B) In need of targeted assistance.**

33 **“(c) Technical assistance that the department will provide to a school district that is:**

34 **“(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an**  
35 **English language learner program, taking into account the specific learning challenges and**

1 demographics of the students; or  
2 “(B) In need of targeted assistance.  
3 “(d) Guidelines for how the department shall direct a school district on how to expend  
4 moneys received under ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) if the school district is:  
5 “(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an  
6 English language learner program, taking into account the specific learning challenges and  
7 demographics of the students; or  
8 “(B) In need of targeted assistance.  
9 “(4) In addition to the duties of the work group prescribed by subsection (3) of this sec-  
10 tion, the work group shall establish criteria to define and identify long-term English language  
11 learners and develop recommendations for best practices on the following:  
12 “(a) Providing ongoing support to students of a school district who no longer are eligible  
13 for or enrolled in an English language learner program under ORS 336.079.  
14 “(b) Engaging parents and delivering essential notifications related to English language  
15 learner programs.  
16 “(c) Identifying students who are eligible to be enrolled in an English language learner  
17 program, including any identification methods that occur before a student enrolls in  
18 kindergarten.  
19 “(d) Providing accommodations for assessments for English language learners.  
20 “(e) Assessing English language learners, which may allow for a list of assessments to  
21 be approved by the department.  
22 “(f) Acquiring student library books in languages other than English.  
23 “(g) Providing support to students who have been identified as long-term English lan-  
24 guage learners.  
25 “(5) Taking into consideration the work of the work group under this section, the State  
26 Board of Education shall adopt rules:  
27 “(a) Related to the work of the work group as described in subsection (3) of this section  
28 no later than January 1, 2016.  
29 “(b) Related to the work of the work group as described in subsection (4) of this section  
30 no later than January 1, 2017.  
31 “SECTION 4. Section 3 of this 2015 Act is repealed on January 2, 2017.  
32 “SECTION 5. Section 6 of this 2015 Act is added to and made a part of ORS 327.006 to  
33 327.133.  
34 “SECTION 6. (1) Each school district shall prepare an annual report that:  
35 “(a) Identifies the total amounts that are:  
36 “(A) Allocated to the school district from the State School Fund for students eligible for  
37 and enrolled in an English language learner program as provided by ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii);  
38 “(B) Expended from the amounts identified in subparagraph (A) of this paragraph for  
39 students in average daily membership who are eligible for and enrolled in an English lan-  
40 guage learner program; and  
41 “(C) Expended as described in subparagraph (B) of this paragraph by category of ex-  
42 penditure, as identified and defined by the State Board of Education by rule.  
43 “(b) Summarizes the progress for a school district on meeting objectives and the needs  
44 of students eligible for and enrolled in an English language learner program.  
45 “(c) Provides information on student demographics, including:

1       “(A) The average number of years students have been enrolled in an English language  
2 learner program;

3       “(B) The average number of years the students have attended their current schools;

4       “(C) The percentage of students who also receive special education and related services;  
5 and

6       “(D) Any other information required by the Department of Education.

7       “(2) The report required under subsection (1) of this section must:

8       “(a) Be filed with the Department of Education by September 1 of each year;

9       “(b) Cover the school year ending on the preceding June 30; and

10       “(c) Comply with the form and content requirements for the report that are prescribed  
11 by the Department of Education.

12       “(3) Notwithstanding subsection (2)(a) of this section and pursuant to rules adopted by  
13 the State Board of Education, the Superintendent of Public Instruction may waive a report-  
14 ing date or specify an alternative date for filing the report if a human-created disaster or a  
15 natural disaster affects the ability of the school district to file a report by the specified date.

16       “(4) Prior to January 1 of each odd-numbered year, the Department of Education shall  
17 submit to the interim legislative committees on education a report on the data collected  
18 under subsection (2) of this section. The report must include the data collected for the pre-  
19 ceding two school years.

20       “SECTION 7. A school district shall first file the report required under section 6 of this  
21 2015 Act by July 1, 2016.

22       “SECTION 8. ORS 336.079 is amended to read:

23       “336.079. (1) As used in this section, ‘English language learner’ means a student who:

24       “(a) Has limited English language proficiency because English is not the native language  
25 of the student or the student comes from an environment where a language other than  
26 English has had a significant impact on the student’s level of English language proficiency;  
27 and

28       “(b) Meets any other criteria established by the State Board of Education by rule.

29       “(2) Specific courses to teach speaking, reading and writing of the English language shall be  
30 provided at kindergarten and each grade level to [*those children*] students who are unable to  
31 [*profit*] benefit from classes taught in English. [*Such*] The courses shall be taught [*to such a level*  
32 *in school as may be required until children are able to profit*] at school until the students are able  
33 to benefit from classes conducted in English.

34       “(3) The Department of Education shall develop and implement a statewide plan to sup-  
35 port students eligible for and enrolled in an English language learner program under this  
36 section.

37       “(4) Each school district shall file a report related to students eligible for and enrolled  
38 in an English language learner program as provided by section 6 of this 2015 Act.

39       “(5)(a) Based on the report received under subsection (4) of this section, the department  
40 shall identify school districts that are:

41       “(A) Not meeting objectives and the needs of students eligible for and enrolled in an  
42 English language learner program, taking into account the specific learning challenges and  
43 demographics of the students; or

44       “(B) In need of targeted assistance.

45       “(b) The department, in consultation with a school district identified under paragraph (a)

1 of this subsection, shall establish the expected growth in student progress indicators, and the  
2 expected benchmarks for student progress indicators, for English language learners of the  
3 school district. The interventions shall be provided for four years after the school district  
4 has been identified.

5 “(c) The department, in consultation with a school district identified under paragraph  
6 (a)(A) of this subsection, shall design and implement an accountability system of progressive  
7 interventions for the school district. The interventions shall be provided for four years after  
8 the school district has been identified.

9 “(d) The department shall provide technical assistance to school districts that have been  
10 identified under paragraph (a)(B) of this subsection. Technical assistance shall be provided  
11 for four years after the school district has been identified.

12 “(e) If a school district has been identified under paragraph (a) of this subsection for four  
13 years and has not met the expected growth in student progress indicators, and the expected  
14 benchmarks for student progress indicators, established under paragraph (b) of this sub-  
15 section, the department shall direct the school district on how to expend moneys received  
16 under ORS 327.013 (1)(c)(A)(ii) for up to three years.

17 “**SECTION 9.** (1) The Statewide English Language Learner Program Account is estab-  
18 lished in the State Treasury, separate and distinct from the General Fund. Interest earned  
19 by the Statewide English Language Learner Program Account shall be credited to the Gen-  
20 eral Fund.

21 “(2) Moneys in the Statewide English Language Learner Program Account are contin-  
22 uously appropriated to the Department of Education for statewide activities related to Eng-  
23 lish language learner programs.

24 “(3) The Department of Education, on behalf of the State of Oregon, may solicit and ac-  
25 cept gifts, grants or donations from public and private sources for English language learner  
26 programs. Moneys received under this subsection shall be deposited into the Statewide  
27 English Language Learner Program Account.

28 “**SECTION 10.** ORS 327.008, as amended by section 6, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014, is  
29 amended to read:

30 “327.008. (1) There is established a State School Fund in the General Fund. The fund shall con-  
31 sist of moneys appropriated by the Legislative Assembly and moneys transferred from the Education  
32 Stability Fund. The State School Fund is continuously appropriated to the Department of Education  
33 for the purposes of ORS 327.006 to 327.077, 327.095, 327.099, 327.101, 327.125, 327.137, 327.348,  
34 336.575, 336.580, 336.635, 342.173, 343.243, 343.533 and 343.961 and sections 1 to 3, chapter 735,  
35 Oregon Laws 2013, and section 2, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

36 “(2) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each school district a State  
37 School Fund grant, consisting of the positive amount equal to a general purpose grant and a facility  
38 grant and a transportation grant and a high cost disabilities grant minus local revenue, computed  
39 as provided in ORS 327.011 and 327.013.

40 “(3) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each education service district  
41 a State School Fund grant as calculated under ORS 327.019.

42 “(4) All figures used in the determination of the distribution of the State School Fund shall be  
43 estimates for the same year as the distribution occurs, unless otherwise specified.

44 “(5) Numbers of students in average daily membership used in the distribution formula shall be  
45 the numbers as of June of the year of distribution.

1 “(6) A school district may not use the portion of the State School Fund grant that is attributable  
2 to the facility grant for capital construction costs.

3 “(7) The total amount of the State School Fund that is distributed as facility grants may not  
4 exceed \$20 million in any biennium. If the total amount to be distributed as facility grants exceeds  
5 this limitation, the Department of Education shall prorate the amount of funds available for facility  
6 grants among those school districts that qualified for a facility grant.

7 “(8) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer to the Pediatric Nursing Fa-  
8 cility Account established in section 5, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014, the amount necessary to pay  
9 the costs of educational services provided to students admitted to pediatric nursing facilities as  
10 provided in section 2, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014.

11 “(9) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the amount of \$18 million from  
12 the State School Fund to the High Cost Disabilities Account established in ORS 327.348.

13 “(10)(a) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$33 million from the State  
14 School Fund to the Network of Quality Teaching and Learning Fund established under ORS 342.953.

15 “(b) For the purpose of making the transfer under this subsection:

16 “(A) The total amount available for all distributions from the State School Fund shall be reduced  
17 by \$5 million;

18 “(B) The amount distributed to school districts from the State School Fund under this section  
19 and ORS 327.013 shall be reduced by \$14 million; and

20 “(C) The amount distributed to education service districts from the State School Fund under this  
21 section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by \$14 million.

22 “(c) For each biennium, the amounts identified in paragraph (b)(B) and (C) of this subsection  
23 shall be adjusted by the same percentage by which the amount appropriated to the State School  
24 Fund for that biennium is increased or decreased compared [to] **with** the preceding biennium, as  
25 determined by the Department of Education after consultation with the Legislative Fiscal Officer.

26 “**(11) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$12.5 million from the**  
27 **State School Fund to the Statewide English Language Learner Program Account established**  
28 **under section 9 of this 2015 Act.**

29 “[11] **(12)** Each fiscal year, the Department of Education may expend up to \$550,000 from the  
30 State School Fund for the contract described in ORS 329.488. The amount distributed to education  
31 service districts from the State School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced  
32 by the amount expended by the department under this subsection.

33 “[12] **(13)** Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up to \$350,000 from the  
34 State School Fund to provide administration of and support for the development of talented and  
35 gifted education under ORS 343.404.

36 “[13] **(14)** Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up to \$150,000 from the  
37 State School Fund for the administration of a program to increase the number of speech-language  
38 pathologists and speech-language pathology assistants under ORS 348.394 to 348.406.

39 “[14] **(15)** Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall transfer the amount of \$2.5  
40 million from the State School Fund to the Small School District Supplement Fund established in  
41 section 3, chapter 735, Oregon Laws 2013.

42 “**SECTION 11.** ORS 327.008, as amended by section 7, chapter 735, Oregon Laws 2013, and  
43 section 7, chapter 81, Oregon Laws 2014, is amended to read:

44 “327.008. (1) There is established a State School Fund in the General Fund. The fund shall con-  
45 sist of moneys appropriated by the Legislative Assembly and moneys transferred from the Education

1 Stability Fund. The State School Fund is continuously appropriated to the Department of Education  
2 for the purposes of ORS 327.006 to 327.077, 327.095, 327.099, 327.101, 327.125, 327.137, 327.348,  
3 336.575, 336.580, 336.635, 342.173, 343.243, 343.533 and 343.961 and section 2, chapter 81, Oregon  
4 Laws 2014.

5 “(2) There shall be apportioned from the State School Fund to each school district a State

26 the State School Fund to the High Cost Disabilities Account established in ORS 327.348.

27 “(10)(a) Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$33 million from the State  
28 School Fund to the Network of Quality Teaching and Learning Fund established under ORS 342.953.

29 “(b) For the purpose of making the transfer under this subsection:

30 “(A) The total amount available for all distributions from the State School Fund shall be reduced  
31 by \$5 million;

32 “(B) The amount distributed to school districts from the State School Fund under this section  
33 and ORS 327.013 shall be reduced by \$14 million; and

34 “(C) The amount distributed to education service districts from the State School Fund under this  
35 section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced by \$14 million.

36 “(c) For each biennium, the amounts identified in paragraph (b)(B) and (C) of this subsection  
37 shall be adjusted by the same percentage by which the amount appropriated to the State School  
38 Fund for that biennium is increased or decreased compared [to] **with** the preceding biennium, as  
39 determined by the Department of Education after consultation with the Legislative Fiscal Officer.

40 “(11) **Each biennium, the Department of Education shall transfer \$12.5 million from the**  
41 **State School Fund to the Statewide English Language Learner Program Account established**  
42 **under section 9 of this 2015 Act.**

43 “[11] (12) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education may expend up to \$550,000 from the  
44 State School Fund for the contract described in ORS 329.488. The amount distributed to education  
45 service districts from the State School Fund under this section and ORS 327.019 shall be reduced

1 by the amount expended by the department under this subsection.

2 “[~~(12)~~] (13) Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up to \$350,000 from the  
3 State School Fund to provide administration of and support for the development of talented and  
4 gifted education under ORS 343.404.

5 “[~~(13)~~] (14) Each biennium, the Department of Education may expend up to \$150,000 from the  
6 State School Fund for the administration of a program to increase the number of speech-language  
7 pathologists and speech-language pathology assistants under ORS 348.394 to 348.406.

8 “**SECTION 12. The amendments to ORS 327.008 by sections 10 and 11 of this 2015 Act**  
9 **apply to State School Fund distributions commencing with the 2015-2016 distributions.**

10 “**SECTION 13.** ORS 327.013 is amended to read:

11 “327.013. The State School Fund distributions for school districts include the following grants:

12 “(1) General Purpose Grant = Funding Percentage × Target Grant × District extended  
13 ADMw. For the purpose of the calculation made under this subsection:

14 “(a) The funding percentage shall be calculated by the Superintendent of Public Instruction to  
15 distribute as nearly as practicable the total sum of money available for distribution.

16 “(b) Target Grant = Statewide Target per ADMw Grant + Teacher Experience Factor. For the  
17 purpose of the calculation made under this paragraph:

18 “(A) Statewide Target per ADMw Grant = \$4,500.

19 “(B) Teacher Experience Factor = \$25 × {District average teacher experience – statewide  
20 average teacher experience}. As used in this subparagraph, ‘average teacher experience’ means the  
21 average, in years, of teaching experience of licensed teachers as reported to the Department of Ed-  
22 ucation.

23 “(c) District extended ADMw = ADMw or ADMw of the prior year, whichever is greater. The  
24 calculation of the district extended ADMw must be made as provided by ORS 338.155 (1)(b) if a  
25 public charter school is located in the school district. For the purpose of this paragraph:

26 “(A) Weighted average daily membership or ADMw = average daily membership + an addi-  
27 tional amount computed as follows:

28 “(i) 1.0 for each student in average daily membership eligible for special education as a child  
29 with a disability under ORS 343.035, which may not exceed 11 percent of the district’s ADM without  
30 review and approval by the Department of Education. Children with disabilities eligible for special  
31 education in adult local correctional facilities, as defined in ORS 169.005, or adult regional  
32 correctional facilities, as defined in ORS 169.620, may not be included in the calculation made under  
33 this sub-subparagraph.

34 “(ii) 0.5 for each student in average daily membership eligible for and enrolled in an English  
35 [*as a second*] language **learner** program under ORS 336.079.

36 “(iii) 0.2 for each student in average daily membership enrolled in a union high school district  
37 or in an area of a unified school district where the district is only responsible for educating students  
38 in grades 9 through 12 in that area.

39 “(iv) -0.1 for each student in average daily membership enrolled in an elementary district op-  
40 erating kindergarten through grade six or kindergarten through grade eight or in an area of a uni-  
41 fied school district where the district is only responsible for educating students in kindergarten  
42 through grade eight.

43 “(v) 0.25 times the sum of the following:

44 “(I) The number of students who are in average daily membership and who are also in poverty  
45 families, as determined by the Department of Education based on rules adopted by the State Board

1 of Education that incorporate poverty data published by the United States Census Bureau, student  
2 data provided by school districts and other data identified by the board;

3 “(II) The number of children in foster homes in the district as determined by the report of the  
4 Department of Human Services to the United States Department of Education, ‘Annual Statistical  
5 Report on Children in Foster Homes and Children in Families Receiving AFDC Payments in Excess  
6 of the Poverty Income Level,’ or its successor, for October 31 of the year prior to the year of dis-  
7 tribution; and

8 “(III) The number of children in the district in state-recognized facilities for neglected and de-  
9 linquent children, based on information from the Department of Human Services for October 31 of  
10 the year prior to the year of distribution.

11 “(vi) The amount determined under ORS 327.077 for each remote small elementary school and  
12 for each small high school in the district.

13 “(B) All numbers of children used for the computation in this paragraph must reflect any district  
14 consolidations that have occurred since the numbers were compiled.

15 “(C) The total additional weight that shall be assigned to any student in average daily mem-  
16 bership in a district, exclusive of students described in subparagraph (A)(v) and (vi) of this para-  
17 graph, may not exceed 2.0.

18 “(2) High cost disabilities grant = the total amount received by a school district under ORS  
19 327.348 for providing special education and related services to resident pupils with disabilities.

20 “(3)(a) Transportation grant equals:

21 “(A) 70 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts ranked below the 80th  
22 percentile under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

23 “(B) 80 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts ranked in or above  
24 the 80th percentile but below the 90th percentile under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

25 “(C) 90 percent of approved transportation costs for those school districts ranked in or above  
26 the 90th percentile under paragraph (b) of this subsection.

27 “(b) Each fiscal year, the Department of Education shall rank school districts based on the ap-  
28 proved transportation costs per ADM of each school district, ranking the school district with the  
29 highest approved transportation costs per ADM at the top of the order.

30 “(4)(a) Facility Grant = 8 percent of total construction costs of new school buildings.

31 “(b) A school district shall receive a Facility Grant in the distribution year that a new school  
32 building is first used.

33 “(c) As used in this subsection:

34 “(A) ‘New school building’ includes new school buildings, structures added onto existing school  
35 buildings and premanufactured structures added to a school district if those buildings or structures  
36 are to be used for instructing students.

37 “(B) ‘Construction costs’ does not include costs for land acquisition.

38 “**SECTION 14.** ORS 327.345 is amended to read:

39 “327.345. (1) As used in this section, [‘*ESL student*’] ‘**ELL student**’ means a student who is eli-  
40 gible for and enrolled in an English [*as a second*] language **learner** program under ORS 336.079.

41 “(2) In addition to distributing moneys through the State School Fund, the Department of Edu-  
42 cation may award grants to school districts for the costs of training English [*as a second*] language  
43 **learner** teachers.

44 “(3) The grants shall be available to any school district:

45 “(a) In which three percent or more of the students enrolled are [*ESL*] **ELL** students;



1 “(b) That serves [ESL] **ELL** students or bilingual students within a large geographic area in the  
2 district;

3 “(c) That has a high growth, as defined by rule of the State Board of Education, of [ESL] **ELL**  
4 students or bilingual students in any school year; or

5 “(d) That can demonstrate extraordinary need, as defined by rule of the board, for English [*as*  
6 *a second*] language **learner** teachers or training for English [*as a second*] language **learner** teachers.

7 “(4) A school district that receives a grant under this section may use the grant to reimburse  
8 teachers for tuition costs associated with completing an English [*as a second*] language **learner** or  
9 a bilingual teaching program.

10 “(5) The department may seek and accept gifts, grants and donations from any source and fed-  
11 eral funds for the purpose of carrying out the grant program under this section.

12 “(6) The board may adopt any rules necessary for the administration of the grant program. The  
13 rules adopted by the board shall include a method for determining the grant amount that a qualified  
14 school district may receive under this section.

15 “**SECTION 15.** ORS 329.157 is amended to read:

16 “329.157. (1) Community learning centers shall promote identification and coordination of exist-  
17 ing resources including, but not limited to, the following services and activities:

18 “(a) Before-school and after-school enrichment activities linked with the school curriculum;

19 “(b) Youth development and service learning activities;

20 “(c) Child care programs;

21 “(d) Mentoring and tutoring programs;

22 “(e) Parent literacy and adult education programs;

23 “(f) Prenatal and early childhood support programs;

24 “(g) Parent education and support groups;

23 tion to serve the needs of post-secondary students, including but not limited to:

24 “(a) Courses as offered to the regular full-time resident post-secondary student consisting of  
25 professional preparatory courses and professional supplementary, technical, academic and profes-  
26 sional courses;

27 “(b) Developmental education, consisting of adult basic education, high school completion  
28 courses for a high school diploma, instruction to pass the General Educational Development (GED)  
29 tests, English *[as a second language instruction]* **language learner programs**, and remedial in-  
30 struction;
