13 (2) INCREASING SHORT-TERM DEFICIT.—Sec-  
14 tion 404(e) of S. Con. Res. 13 (111th Congress), the  
15 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year  
16 2010, is repealed.

17 **SEC. 402. SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST LEGISLATION**  
18 **INCREASING LONG-TERM DEFICITS.**

19 (a) CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE ANALYSIS OF  
20 PROPOSALS.—The Director of the Congressional Budget  
21 Office shall, to the extent practicable, prepare for each bill  
22 and joint resolution reported from committee (except  
23 measures within the jurisdiction of the Committee on Ap-  
24 propriations), and amendments thereto, amendments be-  
25 tween the Houses in relation thereto, and conference re-

1 ports thereon, an estimate of whether the measure would  
2 cause, relative to current law, a net increase in on-budget  
3 deficits in excess of \$5,000,000,000 in any of the 4 con-  
4 secutive 10-year periods beginning with the first fiscal  
5 year that is 10 years after the budget year provided for  
6 in the most recently adopted concurrent resolution on the  
7 budget.

8 (b) POINT OF ORDER.—It shall not be in order in  
9 the Senate to consider any bill, joint resolution, amend-  
10 ment, motion, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
11 ference report that would cause a net increase in on-budg-  
12 et deficits in excess of \$5,000,000,000 in any of the 4  
13 consecutive 10-year periods described in subsection (a).

14 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL IN THE  
15 SENATE.—

16 (1) WAIVER.—Subsection (b) may be waived or  
17 suspended only by the affirmative vote of three-fifths  
18 of the Members, duly chosen and sworn.

19 (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-  
20 fifths of the Members, duly chosen and sworn, shall  
21 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the  
22 Chair on a point of order raised under subsection  
23 (b).

24 (d) LIMITATION.—The provisions of this section shall  
25 not apply to any bills, joint resolutions, amendments, mo-

1 tions, amendment between the Houses, or conference re-  
2 ports for which the chairman of the Committee on the  
3 Budget of the Senate has made adjustments to the alloca-  
4 tions, levels, or limits contained in this resolution pursuant  
5 to section 303(1).

6 (e) DETERMINATIONS OF BUDGET LEVELS.—For  
7 purposes of this section, the levels of net deficit increases  
8 shall be determined on the basis of estimates provided by  
9 the Committee on the Budget of the Senate.

10 (f) REPEAL.—In the Senate, section 311 of S. Con.  
11 Res. 70 (110th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
12 the budget for fiscal year 2009, shall no longer apply.

13 **SEC. 403. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST ADVANCE APPROPRIA-**  
14 **TIONS.**

15 (a) IN GENERAL.—

16 (1) POINT OF ORDER.—Except as provided in  
17 subsection (b), it shall not be in order in the Senate  
18 to consider any bill, joint resolution, motion, amend-  
19 ment, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
20 ference report that would provide an advance appro-  
21 priation for a discretionary account.

22 (2) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term  
23 “advance appropriation” means any new budget au-  
24 thority provided in a bill or joint resolution making  
25 appropriations for fiscal year 2016 that first be-

1 comes available for any fiscal year after 2016, or  
2 any new budget authority provided in a bill or joint  
3 resolution making general appropriations or con-  
4 tinuing appropriations for fiscal year 2017, that first  
5 becomes available for any fiscal year after 2017.

6 (b) EXCEPTIONS.—Advance appropriations may be  
7 provided—

8 (1) for fiscal years 2017 and 2018 for pro-  
9 grams, projects, activities, or accounts identified in  
10 the joint explanatory statement of managers accom-  
11 panying this resolution under the heading “Accounts  
12 Identified for Advance Appropriations” in an aggre-  
13 gate amount not to exceed \$28,852,000,000 in new  
14 budget authority in each year;

15 (2) for the Corporation for Public Broad-  
16 casting; and

17 (3) for the Department of Veterans Affairs for  
18 the Medical Services, Medical Support and Compli-  
19 ance, and Medical Facilities accounts of the Vet-  
20 erans Health Administration.

21 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—

22 (1) WAIVER.—In the Senate, subsection (a)  
23 may be waived or suspended only by an affirmative  
24 vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly chosen and  
25 sworn.

1           (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-  
2           fifths of the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and  
3           sworn, shall be required to sustain an appeal of the  
4           ruling of the Chair on a point of order raised under  
5           subsection (a).

6           (d) FORM OF POINT OF ORDER.—A point of order  
7           under subsection (a) may be raised by a Senator as pro-  
8           vided in section 313(e) of the Congressional Budget Act  
9           of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 644(e)).

10          (e) CONFERENCE REPORTS.—When the Senate is  
11          considering a conference report on, or an amendment be-  
12          tween the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint resolution,  
13          upon a point of order being made by any Senator pursuant  
14          to this section, and such point of order being sustained,  
15          such material contained in such conference report or  
16          House amendment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall  
17          proceed to consider the question of whether the Senate  
18          shall recede from its amendment and concur with a fur-  
19          ther amendment, or concur in the House amendment with  
20          a further amendment, as the case may be, which further  
21          amendment shall consist of only that portion of the con-  
22          ference report or House amendment, as the case may be,  
23          not so stricken. Any such motion in the Senate shall be  
24          debatable. In any case in which such point of order is sus-  
25          tained against a conference report (or Senate amendment

1 derived from such conference report by operation of this  
 2 subsection), no further amendment shall be in order.

3 **SEC. 404. SUPERMAJORITY ENFORCEMENT OF UNFUNDED**  
 4 **MANDATES.**

5 Paragraphs (1) and (2) of section 425(a) of the Con-  
 6 gressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 658d(a)) shall  
 7 be subject to the waiver and appeal requirements of sub-  
 8 sections (c)(2) and (d)(3), respectively, of section 904 of  
 9 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621  
 10 note).

11 **SEC. 405. REPEAL OF SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST**  
 12 **CERTAIN RECONCILIATION LEGISLATION.**

13 Section 202 of S. Con. Res. 21 (110th Congress), the  
 14 concurrent resolution on the budget for fiscal year 2008,  
 15 shall no longer apply in the Senate.

16 **SEC. 406. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST CHANGES IN MANDA-**  
 17 **TORY PROGRAMS.**

18 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term  
 19 “CHIMP” means a provision that—

20 (1) would have been estimated as affecting di-  
 21 rect spending or receipts under section 252 of the  
 22 Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control  
 23 Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 902) (as in effect prior to  
 24 September 30, 2002) if the provision was included

1 in legislation other than an appropriations bill or  
2 joint resolution; and

3 (2) does not result in a net decrease in outlays  
4 over the period of the total of the current year, the  
5 budget year, and all fiscal years covered under the  
6 most recently adopted concurrent resolution on the  
7 budget.

8 (b) POINT OF ORDER.—

9 (1) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be  
10 in order to consider an appropriations bill or joint  
11 resolution, or an amendment to, conference report  
12 on, or amendment between the Houses in relation to  
13 such a bill or joint resolution, that contains a  
14 CHIMP that, if enacted, would cause the total budg-  
15 et authority of all such CHIMPs enacted in relation  
16 to a fiscal year to be more than the amount specified  
17 in paragraph (2).

18 (2) AMOUNT.—The amount specified in this  
19 paragraph is—

20 (A) for fiscal year 2016, \$19,000,000,000;

21 (B) for fiscal year 2017, \$16,000,000,000;

22 (C) for fiscal year 2018, \$12,000,000,000;

23 (D) for fiscal year 2019, \$8,000,000,000;

24 (E) for fiscal year 2020, \$4,000,000,000;

25 and



1 (F) for fiscal year 2021, and each fiscal  
2 year thereafter, \$0.

3 (c) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether  
4 a provision is subject to a point of order under subsection  
5 (b) shall be made by the Chairman of the Committee on  
6 the Budget of the Senate.

7 (d) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—Sub-  
8 section (b) may be waived or suspended in the Senate only  
9 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly  
10 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of  
11 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall  
12 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair  
13 on a point of order raised under subsection (b).

14 (e) REPEAL.—In the Senate, section 314 of S. Con.  
15 Res. 70 (110th Congress), the concurrent resolution on  
16 the budget for fiscal year 2009, shall no longer apply.

17 **SEC. 407. PROHIBITION ON AGREEING TO LEGISLATION**  
18 **WITHOUT A SCORE.**

19 (a) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be in  
20 order to vote on passage of matter that requires an esti-  
21 mate described in section 402 of the Congressional Budget  
22 Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653), unless such estimate was  
23 made publicly available on the website of the Congres-  
24 sional Budget Office not later than 28 hours before the  
25 time the vote commences.

1 (b) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—

2 (1) WAIVER.—In the Senate, subsection (a)  
3 may be waived or suspended only by an affirmative  
4 vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly chosen and  
5 sworn.

6 (2) APPEAL.—An affirmative vote of three-  
7 fifths of the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and  
8 sworn, shall be required to sustain an appeal of the  
9 ruling of the Chair on a point of order raised under  
10 subsection (a).

11 **SEC. 408. PROTECTING THE SAVINGS IN REPORTED REC-**  
12 **ONCILIATION BILLS.**

13 In the Senate, section 310(d)(1) of the Congressional  
14 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 641(d)(1)) shall apply and  
15 may be waived in accordance with the procedures applica-  
16 ble to a point of order raised under section 310(d)(2) of  
17 such Act.

18 **SEC. 409. POINT OF ORDER AGAINST EXCEEDING FUNDS**  
19 **DESIGNATED FOR OVERSEAS CONTINGENCY**  
20 **OPERATIONS.**

21 (a) POINT OF ORDER.—It shall not be in order in  
22 the Senate to consider a provision in any bill, joint resolu-  
23 tion, amendment, motion, amendment between the  
24 Houses, or conference report that designates for overseas  
25 contingency operations, in accordance with section

1 251(b)(2)(A) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency  
2 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)(2)(A)),  
3 funds that would cause the total amount of funds des-  
4 ignated for overseas contingency operations—

5 (1) for fiscal year 2016, to be more than  
6 \$57,997,000,000; or

7 (2) for fiscal year 2017, to be more than  
8 \$59,500,000,000.

9 (b) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether  
10 a provision is subject to a point of order under this section  
11 shall be made by the Chairman of the Committee on the  
12 Budget of the Senate.

13 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—This  
14 section may be waived or suspended in the Senate only  
15 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly  
16 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of  
17 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall  
18 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair  
19 on a point of order raised under this section.

20 (d) FORM OF POINT OF ORDER.—A point of order  
21 under this section may be raised by a Senator as provided  
22 in section 313(e) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974  
23 (2 U.S.C. 644(e)).

24 (e) CONFERENCE REPORTS.—When the Senate is  
25 considering a conference report on, or an amendment be-

1 tween the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint resolution,  
 2 upon a point of order being made by any Senator under  
 3 this section, and such point of order being sustained, such  
 4 material contained in such conference report or amend-  
 5 ment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall proceed to  
 6 consider the question of whether the Senate shall recede  
 7 from its amendment and concur with a further amend-  
 8 ment, or concur in the House amendment with a further  
 9 amendment, as the case may be, which further amendment  
 10 shall consist of only that portion of the conference report  
 11 or House amendment, as the case may be, not so stricken.  
 12 Any such motion shall be debatable. In any case in which  
 13 such point of order is sustained against a conference re-  
 14 port (or Senate amendment derived from such conference  
 15 report by operation of this subsection), no further amend-  
 16 ment shall be in order.

17 **SEC. 410. SENATE POINT OF ORDER AGAINST PROVISIONS**  
 18 **OF APPROPRIATIONS LEGISLATION THAT**  
 19 **CONSTITUTE CHANGES IN MANDATORY PRO-**  
 20 **GRAMS AFFECTING THE CRIME VICTIMS**  
 21 **FUND.**

22 (a) IN GENERAL.—In the Senate, it shall not be in  
 23 order to consider any appropriations legislation, including  
 24 any amendment thereto, motion in relation thereto, or  
 25 conference report thereon, that includes any provision or

1 provisions affecting the Crime Victims Fund, as defined  
2 by section 1402 of the Victims of Crime Act of 1984 (42  
3 U.S.C. 10601), which constitutes a change in a mandatory  
4 program that would have been estimated as affecting di-  
5 rect spending or receipts under section 252 of the Bal-  
6 anced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985  
7 (as in effect prior to September 30, 2002) were they in-  
8 cluded in legislation other than appropriations legislation.  
9 A point of order pursuant to this section shall be raised  
10 against such provision or provisions as described in sub-  
11 sections (d) and (e).

12 (b) DETERMINATION.—The determination of whether  
13 a provision is subject to a point of order pursuant to this  
14 section shall be made by the Committee on the Budget  
15 of the Senate.

16 (c) SUPERMAJORITY WAIVER AND APPEAL.—This  
17 section may be waived or suspended in the Senate only  
18 by an affirmative vote of three-fifths of the Members, duly  
19 chosen and sworn. An affirmative vote of three-fifths of  
20 the Members of the Senate, duly chosen and sworn, shall  
21 be required to sustain an appeal of the ruling of the Chair  
22 on a point of order raised under this section.

23 (d) GENERAL POINT OF ORDER.—It shall be in order  
24 for a Senator to raise a single point of order that several  
25 provisions of a bill, resolution, amendment, motion, or con-

1 ference report violate this section. The Presiding Officer  
2 may sustain the point of order as to some or all of the  
3 provisions against which the Senator raised the point of  
4 order. If the Presiding Officer so sustains the point of  
5 order as to some of the provisions (including provisions  
6 of an amendment, motion, or conference report) against  
7 which the Senator raised the point of order, then only  
8 those provisions (including provision of an amendment,  
9 motion, or conference report) against which the Presiding  
10 Officer sustains the point of order shall be deemed strick-  
11 en pursuant to this section. Before the Presiding Officer  
12 rules on such a point of order, any Senator may move to  
13 waive such a point of order as it applies to some or all  
14 of the provisions against which the point of order was  
15 raised. Such a motion to waive is amendable in accordance  
16 with rules and precedents of the Senate. After the Pre-  
17 siding Officer rules on such a point of order, any Senator  
18 may appeal the ruling of the Presiding Officer on such  
19 a point of order as it applies to some or all of the provi-  
20 sions on which the Presiding Officer ruled.

21 (e) FORM OF THE POINT OF ORDER.—When the  
22 Senate is considering a conference report on, or an amend-  
23 ment between the Houses in relation to, a bill or joint res-  
24 olution, upon a point of order being made by any Senator  
25 pursuant to this section, and such point of order being

1 sustained, such material contained in such conference re-  
2 port or amendment shall be stricken, and the Senate shall  
3 proceed to consider the question of whether the Senate  
4 shall recede from its amendment and concur with a fur-  
5 ther amendment, or concur in the House amendment with  
6 a further amendment, as the case may be, which further  
7 amendment shall consist of only that portion of the con-  
8 ference report or House amendment, as the case may be,  
9 not so stricken. Any such motion shall be debatable. In  
10 any case in which such point of order is sustained against  
11 a conference report (or Senate amendment derived from  
12 such conference report by operation of this subsection),  
13 no further amendment shall be in order.

14 **SEC. 411. ACCURACY IN BUDGET ENFORCEMENT.**

15 (a) **TIMING SHIFTS.**—

16 (1) **DEFINITION.**—In this subsection, the term  
17 “timing shift” means—

18 (A) a delay of the date on which outlays  
19 flowing from direct spending would otherwise  
20 occur from 1 fiscal year to the next fiscal year;  
21 or

22 (B) an acceleration of the date on which  
23 revenues would otherwise occur from 1 fiscal  
24 year to the previous fiscal year.

1           (2) SCORING.—In the Senate, the Chairman of  
2           the Committee on the Budget shall not count timing  
3           shifts in estimating the budgetary effects of a bill,  
4           joint resolution, motion, amendment, amendment be-  
5           tween the Houses, or conference report for purposes  
6           of enforcing—

7                   (A) the Congressional Budget Act of 1974  
8                   (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.);

9                   (B) any allocation, aggregate, or level  
10                  under a concurrent resolution on the budget; or

11                  (C) any written statement submitted for  
12                  printing in the Congressional Record by the  
13                  Chairman of the Committee on the Budget of  
14                  the Senate that establishes allocations, aggre-  
15                  gates, and levels for purposes of enforcing the  
16                  Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

17           (b) PROHIBITION OF RESCISSIONS THAT DON'T  
18           SAVE MONEY.—In the Senate, the Chairman of the Com-  
19           mittee on the Budget shall not count any rescission of  
20           budget authority or contract authority that does not have  
21           an effect on outlays in estimating the changes in budget  
22           authority, outlays, or revenues of a bill, joint resolution,  
23           motion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or  
24           conference report for purposes of enforcing—



1           (1) the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2  
2       U.S.C. 621 et seq.);

3           (2) any allocation, aggregate, or level under a  
4       concurrent resolution on the budget; or

5           (3) any written statement submitted for print-  
6       ing in the Congressional Record by the Chairman of  
7       the Committee on the Budget of the Senate that es-  
8       tablishes allocations, aggregates, and levels for pur-  
9       poses of enforcing the Congressional Budget Act of  
10      1974.

11 **SEC. 412. FAIR VALUE ESTIMATES.**

12       Any estimate prepared by the Director of the Con-  
13      gressional Budget Office for a bill, joint, resolution, mo-  
14      tion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
15      ference report under the terms of title V of the Congres-  
16      sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 661 et seq.), shall  
17      include, when practicable, an additional estimate of the  
18      cost, measured on a fair value basis, of changes that would  
19      affect the amount or terms of new Federal loans or loan  
20      guarantees or of modifications to existing Federal loans  
21      or loan guarantees arising from the bill, joint resolution,  
22      motion, amendment, amendment between the Houses, or  
23      conference report.

24 **SEC. 413. HONEST ACCOUNTING ESTIMATES.**

25       (a) DEFINITIONS.—In this section:

1 (1) BUDGET.—The term “budget” means—

2 (A) a concurrent resolution on the budget;

3 or

4 (B) a written statement submitted for  
5 printing in the Congressional Record by the  
6 Chairman of the Committee on the Budget of  
7 the Senate that establishes allocations, aggre-  
8 gates, and levels for purposes of enforcing the  
9 Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

10 (2) BUDGETARY EFFECTS.—The term “budg-  
11 etary effects” means changes in budget authority,  
12 outlays, or revenues.

13 (3) MAJOR LEGISLATION.—

14 (A) DEFINITION.—The term “major legis-  
15 lation” means any bill, resolution, conference  
16 report, or treaty—

17 (i) for which an estimate is prepared  
18 under section 402 of the Congressional  
19 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) that  
20 indicates that not less than 1 of the  
21 amounts described in subparagraph (B),  
22 before incorporating macroeconomic ef-  
23 fects, is greater than \$15,000,000,000 in  
24 any fiscal year of the estimate; or

1 (ii) designated as major legislation by  
2 the Chairman of the Committee on the  
3 Budget of the Senate or the Chairman of  
4 the Committee on the Budget of the House  
5 of Representatives.

6 (B) AMOUNTS.—The amounts described in  
7 this subparagraph are—

8 (i) the sum of the individual positive  
9 changes in budgetary effects, not including  
10 timing shifts, resulting from such measure;  
11 and

12 (ii) the sum of the absolute value of  
13 the individual negative budgetary effects,  
14 not including timing shifts, resulting from  
15 such measure.

16 (4) TIMING SHIFTS.—The term “timing shifts”  
17 means—

18 (A) a delay of the date on which outlays  
19 flowing from direct spending would otherwise  
20 occur from one fiscal year to the next fiscal  
21 year; or

22 (B) an acceleration of the date on which  
23 revenues would otherwise occur from one fiscal  
24 year to the next fiscal year.

1       (b) REQUIREMENT FOR CBO ESTIMATES.—An esti-  
2       mate provided by the Congressional Budget Office under  
3       section 402 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2  
4       U.S.C. 653) for any major legislation shall provide, in ad-  
5       dition to the estimate of budgetary effects without macro-  
6       economic effects, an estimate of the budgetary effects  
7       from changes in economic output, employment, interest  
8       rates, capital stock, and other macroeconomic variables re-  
9       sulting from the major legislation. The total budgetary ef-  
10      fects shall delineate between revenue and outlay effects.

11      (c) REQUIREMENT FOR JCT ESTIMATES.—

12           (1) IN GENERAL.—An estimate provided by the  
13      Joint Committee on Taxation to the Director of the  
14      Congressional Budget Office under section 201(f) of  
15      the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.  
16      601(f)) for any major legislation shall provide, in ad-  
17      dition to the estimate of budgetary effects without  
18      macroeconomic effects, an estimate of the budgetary  
19      effects from changes in economic output, employ-  
20      ment, capital stock, interest rates, and other macro-  
21      economic variables resulting from the major legisla-  
22      tion and an estimate of the distributional effects  
23      across income categories resulting from major legis-  
24      lation.

1           (2) DELINEATION.—The total budgetary effects  
2           shall delineate between revenue and outlay effects.

3           (d) CONTENTS OF ESTIMATES.—An estimate re-  
4           quired to be provided under subsection (b) or (c) shall in-  
5           clude—

6           (1) a qualitative assessment of the budgetary  
7           effects (including macroeconomic variables described  
8           in subsections (b) and (c)) of the major legislation  
9           in the 20-fiscal year period beginning after the last  
10          fiscal year of the most recently adopted budget that  
11          sets forth appropriate levels required under section  
12          301 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2  
13          U.S.C. 632); and

14          (2) an identification of the assumptions and the  
15          source of data underlying the estimate.

16 **SEC. 414. CURRENCY MODERNIZATION.**

17          In the Senate, for purposes of enforcing the Congres-  
18          sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.), any  
19          allocation, aggregate, or level under a concurrent resolu-  
20          tion on the budget, or any written statement submitted  
21          for printing in the Congressional Record by the Chairman  
22          of the Committee on the Budget of the Senate that estab-  
23          lishes allocations, aggregates, and levels for purposes of  
24          enforcing the Congressional Budget Act of 1974, any esti-  
25          mate of the changes in budget authority, outlays, and rev-

1 enues of a provision in a bill, joint resolution, motion,  
2 amendment, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
3 ference report relating to a transition from the \$1 note  
4 to a \$1 coin shall—

5 (1) record the changes in budget authority, out-  
6 lays, and revenues of the provision in the first year  
7 in which the provision takes effect;

8 (2) determine the changes in budget authority,  
9 outlays, and revenues of the provision based on a net  
10 present value estimate of the changes in budget au-  
11 thority, outlays, and revenues of the provision over  
12 a 30-year period; and

13 (3) incorporate the changes in budget authority,  
14 outlays, and revenues of the provision due to behav-  
15 ioral changes.

16 **SEC. 415. CERTAIN ENERGY CONTRACTS.**

17 (a) DEFINITION.—In this section, the term “covered  
18 energy savings contract” means—

19 (1) an energy savings performance contract au-  
20 thorized under section 801 of the National Energy  
21 Conservation Policy Act (42 U.S.C. 8287); and

22 (2) a utility energy service contract, as de-  
23 scribed in the Office of Management and Budget  
24 Memorandum on Federal use of energy savings per-  
25 formance contracting, dated July 25, 1998 (M-98-

1 13), and the Office of Management and Budget  
2 Memorandum on the Federal use of energy saving  
3 performance contracts and utility energy service con-  
4 tracts, dated September 28, 2012 (M-12-21), or  
5 any successor to either memorandum.

6 (b) ESTIMATES.—In the Senate, for purposes of en-  
7 forcing any point of order established under the Congres-  
8 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 621 et seq.) or any  
9 concurrent resolution on the budget, any estimate by the  
10 Congressional Budget Office of the changes in budget au-  
11 thority, outlays, and revenues of a provision in a bill, joint  
12 resolution, amendment, conference report, or amendment  
13 between the Houses modifying the authority to enter, the  
14 scope or terms of, or the use of covered energy savings  
15 contracts shall—

16 (1) record in the first year in which the author-  
17 ity would become effective, the changes in budget  
18 authority, outlays, and revenues (as estimated in ac-  
19 cordance with paragraph (2)) of any modifications to  
20 the authority to enter the covered energy savings  
21 contracts;

22 (2) in estimating the changes in budget author-  
23 ity, outlays, and revenues of the legislation, calculate  
24 the costs and savings arising from covered contracts  
25 on a net present value basis by adding market risk

1 over the useful life of the services or product to the  
2 discount rate in section 502(5)(E) of the Federal  
3 Credit Reform Act of 1990 (2 U.S.C. 661a(5)(E));  
4 and

5 (3) classify the effects of the provision to be  
6 changes in spending subject to the availability of ap-  
7 propriations.

8 (c) **RULE OF CONSTRUCTION.**—Nothing in sub-  
9 section (b) shall be construed to modify the methodology  
10 for estimating the changes in budget authority, outlays,  
11 and revenues of a provision that does not relate to covered  
12 energy savings contracts in a bill, joint resolution, amend-  
13 ment, conference report, or amendment between the  
14 Houses that contains a provision described in subsection  
15 (b).

16 **SEC. 416. LONG-TERM SCORING.**

17 (a) **SCORING OF LEGISLATION INCREASING THE DIS-**  
18 **CRETIONARY SPENDING CAPS.**—An estimate provided by  
19 the Congressional Budget Office under section 402 of the  
20 Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) for any  
21 bill, resolution, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
22 ference report that increases the discretionary spending  
23 limits under section 251(c) of the Balanced Budget and  
24 Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(c))  
25 shall provide, in addition to the estimate under that sec-



1 tion, an estimate of the changes in budget authority, out-  
2 lays, or revenues under the legislation over the period of  
3 fiscal year 2016 through fiscal year 2045.

4 (b) SCORING OF LEGISLATION RELATING TO THE  
5 HIGHWAY TRUST FUND.—An estimate provided by the  
6 Congressional Budget Office under section 402 of the  
7 Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 653) for any  
8 bill, resolution, amendment between the Houses, or con-  
9 ference report that transfers amounts from the General  
10 Fund of the Treasury to the Highway Trust Fund shall  
11 provide, in addition to the estimate under that section, an  
12 estimate of the changes in budget authority, outlays, or  
13 revenues under the legislation over the period of fiscal year  
14 2016 through fiscal year 2045.

15 **SEC. 417. REQUIRING CLEARER REPORTING OF PRO-**  
16 **JECTED FEDERAL SPENDING AND DEFICITS.**

17 When the Congressional Budget Office releases its  
18 annual update to the Budget and Economic Outlook, the  
19 Congressional Budget Office shall provide a projection of  
20 Federal revenues, outlays, and deficits for the 30-year pe-  
21 riod beginning with the budget year, expressed in terms  
22 of dollars and as a percent of gross domestic product, as  
23 part of its annual update required by Public Law 93–344.

1 **SEC. 418. REPORTING ON TAX EXPENDITURES.**

2 The Director of the Congressional Budget Office  
3 shall include in the report submitted under section  
4 202(e)(1) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 the  
5 following:

6 (1) An estimate of the cost of tax expenditures  
7 as a share of gross domestic product for the budget  
8 year and the 9 years following the budget year.

9 (2) Historical data on the cost of tax expendi-  
10 tures as a share of gross domestic product for each  
11 fiscal year beginning with fiscal year 1965 and end-  
12 ing with the budget year.

13 **SEC. 419. CONGRESSIONAL BUDGET OFFICE ESTIMATES.**

14 (a) REQUEST FOR SUPPLEMENTAL ESTIMATES.—In  
15 the case of any legislative provision to which this section  
16 applies, the Congressional Budget Office shall prepare, to  
17 the extent practicable, an estimate of the outlay changes  
18 during the second and third decade of enactment.

19 (b) LEGISLATIVE PROVISIONS TO WHICH THIS SEC-  
20 TION APPLIES.—This section shall apply to any spending  
21 legislative provision—

22 (1) which proposes a change or changes to law  
23 that the Congressional Budget Office determines has  
24 an outlay impact in excess of 0.25 percent of the  
25 gross domestic product of the United States during  
26 the first decade or in the tenth year; or

1           (2) with respect to which the Chairman of the  
2           Committee on the Budget of either the Senate or the  
3           House of Representatives has requested an estimate  
4           described in subsection (a).

5 **SEC. 420. TO REQUIRE TRANSPARENT REPORTING ON THE**  
6                   **ONGOING COSTS AND SAVINGS TO TAX-**  
7                   **PAYERS OF OBAMACARE.**

8           When the Congressional Budget Office releases its  
9           annual update to the Budget and Economic Outlook, the  
10          Congressional Budget Office shall report changes in direct  
11          spending and revenue associated with the Patient Protec-  
12          tion and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–148) and  
13          the Health Care and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010  
14          (Public Law 111–152), including the net impact on defi-  
15          cits, including both on-budget and off-budget effects, in  
16          its annual update required by Public Law 93–344. The  
17          information shall be presented in a format similar to that  
18          of table 2 of the Congressional Budget Office’s March 20,  
19          2010 estimate of the budgetary effects of the Health Care  
20          and Educational Reconciliation Act of 2010, in combina-  
21          tion with the effects of H.R. 3590, the Patient Protection  
22          and Affordable Care Act (PPACA), as passed by the Sen-  
23          ate.

1 **SEC. 421. PROHIBITING THE USE OF GUARANTEE FEES AS**  
2 **AN OFFSET.**

3 In the Senate, for purposes of determining budgetary  
4 impacts to evaluate points of order under the Congres-  
5 sional Budget Act of 1974, this resolution, any previous  
6 budget resolution, and any subsequent budget resolution,  
7 provisions contained in any bill, resolution, amendment,  
8 motion, or conference report that increases or extends the  
9 increase of, any guarantee fees of the Federal National  
10 Mortgage Association and the Federal Home Loan Mort-  
11 gage Corporation shall not be scored with respect to the  
12 level of budget authority, outlays, or revenues contained  
13 in such legislation.

14 **SEC. 422. ADJUSTMENTS FOR SEQUESTRATION REPLACE-**  
15 **MENT.**

16 (a) MECHANISM FOR IMPLEMENTING INCREASE IN  
17 DISCRETIONARY LIMITS.—If a measure becomes law that  
18 amends the discretionary spending limits established  
19 under section 251(c) of the Balanced Budget and Emer-  
20 gency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(c)), the  
21 adjustments to discretionary spending limits under section  
22 251(b) of that Act (2 U.S.C. 901(b)), or the enforcement  
23 procedures established under section 251A of that Act (2  
24 U.S.C. 901a), the Chairman of the Committee on the  
25 Budget of the Senate shall adjust the allocation called for  
26 in section 302(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974

1 (2 U.S.C. 633(a)) to the Committee on Appropriations of  
2 the Senate, and may adjust all other budgetary aggre-  
3 gates, allocations, levels, and limits contained in this reso-  
4 lution, as necessary, consistent with such measure, up to  
5 the amounts specified and reserved in subparagraph (b).

6 (b) AMOUNTS SPECIFIED AND RESERVED.—The  
7 amounts specified (and to be reserved from the allocation  
8 called for in section 302(a) allocation of the Congressional  
9 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 633(a)) to the Committee  
10 on Appropriations of the Senate until such time as the  
11 conditions specified in subsection (a) are met are—

12 (1) for fiscal year 2016—

13 (A) for the revised security category,  
14 \$37,000,000,000 in budget authority (and the  
15 outlays flowing therefrom); and

16 (B) for the revised nonsecurity category,  
17 \$37,000,000,000 in budget authority (and the  
18 outlays flowing therefrom); and

19 (2) for fiscal year 2017—

20 (A) for the revised security category,  
21 \$37,000,000,000 in budget authority (and the  
22 outlays flowing therefrom); and

23 (B) for the revised nonsecurity category,  
24 \$37,000,000,000 in budget authority (and the  
25 outlays flowing therefrom).

1 **SEC. 423. TO CONVEY CLEAR INFORMATION TO CONGRESS**  
2 **AND THE PUBLIC ABOUT PROJECTED FED-**  
3 **ERAL OUTLAYS, REVENUES, AND DEFICITS.**

4 As part of the annual update to the Budget and Eco-  
5 nomic Outlook required by section 202(e) of the Congres-  
6 sional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 602(e)), and at any  
7 other time the Congressional Budget Office releases pro-  
8 jections of Federal deficits over any term of years, the  
9 Congressional Budget Office shall publish with its projec-  
10 tion a 1-page statement—

11 (1) summarizing and categorizing total outlays,  
12 including tax expenditures, receipts, surpluses, and  
13 deficits of the Federal Government on a unified  
14 basis for that same prospective time period;

15 (2) categorizing and subtotaling separately—

16 (A) outlays for mandatory programs and  
17 for discretionary programs;

18 (B) outlays, tax expenditures, payroll tax  
19 revenue, and offsetting receipts for Social Secu-  
20 rity and for Medicare;

21 (C) the surplus or deficit of revenues over  
22 outlays for Social Security and for Medicare;  
23 and

24 (D) revenues.

1 **SEC. 424. ADJUSTMENT FOR WILDFIRE SUPPRESSION**  
 2 **FUNDING.**

3 If a measure becomes law that amends the adjust-  
 4 ments to discretionary spending limits established under  
 5 section 251(b) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency  
 6 Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2 U.S.C. 901(b)) for wildfire  
 7 suppression funding, the Chairman of the Committee on  
 8 the Budget of the Senate may adjust the allocation called  
 9 for in section 302(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of  
 10 1974 (2 U.S.C. 633(a)) to the appropriate committee or  
 11 committees of the Senate, and may adjust all other budg-  
 12 etary aggregates, allocations, levels, and limits contained  
 13 in this resolution, as necessary, consistent with such meas-  
 14 ure.

15 **Subtitle B—Other Provisions**

16 **SEC. 431. OVERSIGHT OF GOVERNMENT PERFORMANCE.**

17 In the Senate, all committees are directed to review  
 18 programs and tax expenditures within their jurisdiction to  
 19 identify waste, fraud, abuse or duplication, and increase  
 20 the use of performance data to inform committee work.  
 21 Committees are also directed to review the matters for  
 22 congressional consideration identified in the Office of In-  
 23 spector General semiannual reports and the Office of In-  
 24 spector General's list of unimplemented recommendations  
 25 and on the Government Accountability Office's High Risk  
 26 list and the annual report to reduce program duplication.

1 Based on these oversight efforts and performance reviews  
2 of programs within their jurisdiction, committees are di-  
3 rected to include recommendations for improved govern-  
4 mental performance in their annual views and estimates  
5 reports required under section 301(d) of the Congressional  
6 Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C. 632(d)) to the Committees  
7 on the Budget.

8 **SEC. 432. BUDGETARY TREATMENT OF CERTAIN DISCRE-**  
9 **TIONARY ADMINISTRATIVE EXPENSES.**

10 In the Senate, notwithstanding section 302(a)(1) of  
11 the Congressional Budget Act of 1974 (2 U.S.C.  
12 633(a)(1)), section 13301 of the Budget Enforcement Act  
13 of 1990 (2 U.S.C. 632 note), and section 2009a of title  
14 39, United States Code, the joint explanatory statement  
15 accompanying the conference report on any concurrent  
16 resolution on the budget shall include in its allocations  
17 under section 302(a) of the Congressional Budget Act of  
18 1974 to the Committees on Appropriations amounts for  
19 the discretionary administrative expenses of the Social Se-  
20 curity Administration and of the Postal Service.

21 **SEC. 433. APPLICATION AND EFFECT OF CHANGES IN ALLO-**  
22 **CATIONS AND AGGREGATES.**

23 (a) APPLICATION.—Any adjustments of allocations  
24 and aggregates made pursuant to this resolution shall—





1 olution in accordance with section 251(b) of the Balanced  
2 Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985 (2  
3 U.S.C. 901(b)).

4 **SEC. 435. EXERCISE OF RULEMAKING POWERS.**

5 Congress adopts the provisions of this title—

6 (1) as an exercise of the rulemaking power of  
7 the Senate, and as such they shall be considered as  
8 part of the rules of the Senate and such rules shall  
9 supersede other rules only to the extent that they  
10 are inconsistent with such other rules; and

11 (2) with full recognition of the constitutional  
12 right of the Senate to change those rules at any  
13 time, in the same manner, and to the same extent  
14 as is the case of any other rule of the Senate.
